8. Description of project:

The project is a 50-foot tall faux monopine tower mounted with three sets of 12 panel antennas for three separate wireless providers. The associated equipment enclosure will be located north of the proposed faux monopine and will consist of the following: one 10-foot by 21-foot concrete equipment pad with four Ericsson RBS 2106 outdoor cabinets, one 11-foot and 6-inch by 16-foot concrete equipment shelter, and one 11-foot and 6-inch by 20-foot concrete equipment shelter. All three equipment shelters and the 50-foot tall faux monopine tower will be surrounded by one 65-foot long by 39-foot wide by 8-foot tall Concrete Masonry Unit (CMU) block wall. Additionally, a 2-foot high retaining wall will be placed adjacently to the east of the equipment enclosure to buttress the proposed 12-foot wide access easement. The project is located adjacent to Highway 79 (APN: 114-180-02) within the North Mountain Subregional Planning area within the unincorporated area of San Diego County.

The project site is located adjacent to Peralta Drive in Warner Springs within unincorporated San Diego County approximately 3,574 ft. in elevation. The site is subject to the General Plan Regional Category, Land Use Designation (18) Multiple Rural Use. Zoning for the site is A70 (Limited Agriculture). The site contains an existing County-owned telecommunications facility with an 82-foot high lattice tower that will remain. Access would be provided by an existing private road/driveway connecting to Highway 79. The site is not covered by any Community Planning or Sponsor Group. The California Department of Forestry (CDF) is responsible for wildlife fire protection for the project.

10. Surrounding land uses and setting :

Lands surrounding the project site are zoned rural residential, agriculture and undeveloped, vacant lands. The topography of the project site and adjacent land contains steep slopes greater than 25%. The site is located within close proximity of Highway 79.

Discussion/Explanation:

Less Than Significant With Mitigation Incorporated: A vista is a view from a particular location or composite views along a roadway or trail. Scenic vistas often refer to views of natural lands, but may also be compositions of natural and developed areas, or even entirely of developed and unnatural areas, such as a scenic vista of a rural town and surrounding agricultural lands. What is scenic to one person may not be scenic to another, so the assessment of what constitutes a scenic vista must consider the perceptions of a variety of viewer groups.

The items that can be seen within a vista are visual resources. Adverse impacts to individual visual resources or the addition of structures or developed areas may or may not adversely affect the vista. Determining the level of impact to a scenic vista requires analyzing the changes to the vista as a whole and also to individual visual resources.

Based on a site visit completed by County staff Merry Tondro on August 13, 2007, the proposed project is located near or within the viewshed of a scenic vista. The viewshed and visible components of the landscape within that viewshed, including the underlying landform and overlaying land cover, establish the visual environment for the scenic vista. The visual environment of the subject scenic vista extends from the hill where the project is proposed to opposing mountains on the southwest side of highway 79. The visual composition consists of vacant mountains and hillsides as well as sparsely populated foothills and valleys. The project is visible from highway 79 and the surrounding parcels with land uses that include spaced rural residential, field crops, open space parks and preserves, and vacant land. Therefore, the proposed project will have a significant visual impact on the surrounding lands.

The proposed project is to be located on a parcel that currently supports a County-owned communications tower and is otherwise vacant. The proposed project will be visible from most of the surrounding lands, particularly in the foothills that lay on either side of Highway 79. The subject parcel currently supports substantial vegetation, predominately shrubs, large bushes, and grasses. There are also many medium-sized boulders found on-site. There are no mature trees on the parcel. As such, the proposed 50-foot tall faux monopine will not have the benefit of pre-existing camouflage. However, the project proposes landscaping to aid in making the unmanned telecommunications facility stealth. The proposed landscaping includes 6 one-gallon Mexican Elderberry trees, 5 one-gallon California Bay Laurel trees, 13 one-gallon Island Bush Poppy shrubs, 12 one-gallon Toyon shrubs, 7 one-gallon Holly Leaf Cherry

shrubs, and 14 one-gallon Sugar Bush shrubs. The addition of this landscaping will mitigate the visual impact of the proposed project to an insignificant level, and will allow the proposed project to be sufficiently camouflaged.

Discussion/Explanation:

No Impact: State scenic highways refer to those highways that are officially designated. A scenic highway is officially designated as a State scenic highway when the local jurisdiction adopts a scenic corridor protection program, applies to the California Department of Transportation for scenic highway approval, and receives notification from Caltrans that the highway has been designated as an official Scenic Highway. Based on a site visit completed by Merry Tondro on August 13, 2007, the proposed project is not located near or visible within the same composite viewshed as a State scenic highway and will not change the visual composition of an existing scenic resource within a State scenic highway. Generally, the area defined within a State scenic highway is the land adjacent to and visible from the vehicular right-of-way. The dimension of a scenic highway is usually identified using a motorist's line of vision, but a reasonable boundary is selected when the view extends to the distant horizon. The project site is on top of a hill, 3,450 feet in elevation within half a mile from Highway 79. Highway 79 is not a designated scenic highway. Therefore, the proposed project will not have any substantial adverse effect on a scenic resource within a State scenic highway.

Discussion/Explanation:

Less Than Significant With Mitigation Incorporated: Visual character is the objective composition of the visible landscape within a viewshed. Visual character is based on the organization of the pattern elements line, form, color, and texture. Visual character is commonly discussed in terms of dominance, scale, diversity and continuity. Visual quality is the viewer's perception of the visual environment and varies based on exposure, sensitivity and expectation of the viewers. The existing visual character and

quality of the project site and surrounding can be characterized as dominance. The site is vacant except for an 82-foot high telecommunications facility owned by the County of San Diego.

The proposed project is an unmanned, wireless telecommunications facility. The proposed project is to be located on a parcel that currently supports a County-owned communications tower and is otherwise vacant. The proposed project will be visible from most of the surrounding lands, particularly in the foothills that lay on either side of Highway 79. The subject parcel currently supports substantial vegetation, predominately shrubs, large bushes, and grasses. There are also many medium-sized boulders found on site. There are no mature trees on the parcel. As such, the proposed 50-foot tall faux monopine will not have the benefit of pre-existing camouflage. However, the project proposes landscaping to aid in making the unmanned telecommunications facility stealth. The proposed landscaping includes 6 one-gallon Mexican Elderberry trees, 5 one-gallon California Bay Laurel trees, 13 one-gallon Island Bush Poppy shrubs, 12 one-gallon Toyon shrubs, 7 one-gallon Holly Leaf Cherry shrubs, and 14 one-gallon Sugar Bush shrubs. No Impact: The project does not propose any use of outdoor lighting or building materials with highly reflective properties such as highly reflective glass or high-gloss surface colors. Therefore, the project will not create any new sources of light pollution that could contribute to skyglow, light trespass or glare and adversely affect day or nighttime views in area.

Less Than Significant Impact: The project site is zoned A70, which is considered to be an agricultural zone. However, the proposed project will not result in a conflict in zoning for agricultural use, because telecommunications facilities are a permitted use in A70 zones and will not create a conflict with existing zoning for agricultural use. Additionally, the project site's land is not under a Williamson Act Contract. Therefore, there will be no conflict with existing zoning for agricultural use, or a Williamson Act contract.

No Impact: Operation of the project will not result in emissions of significant quantities of criteria pollutants listed in the California Ambient Air Quality Standards or toxic air contaminants as identified by the California Air Resources Board. Therefore, the project will not conflict or obstruct with the implementation of the RAQS nor the SIP on a project or cumulative level.

Discussion/Explanation:

Less Than Significant Impact: The project proposes to install a telecommunications tower with associated equipment shelter. However, grading operations associated with the construction of the project would be subject to County of San Diego Grading Ordinance, which requires the implementation of dust control measures. Emissions from the construction phase would be minimal and localized, resulting in pollutant emissions below the screening-level criteria established by SDAPCD Rule 20.2 and by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) CEQA Air Quality Handbook section 6.2 and 6.3. In addition, the vehicle trips generated from the project will result in point one (0.1) Average Daily Trips (ADT). According to the Bay Area Air Quality Management District CEQA Guidelines for Assessing the Air Quality Impacts of Projects and Plans, projects that generate less than 2,000 ADT are below the Screening-Level Criteria established by SDAPCD Rule 20.2 and by the SCAQMD CEQA Air Quality Handbook section 6.2 and 6.3 for criteria pollutants. As such, the project will not violate any air quality standard or contribute substantially to an existing or projected air quality violation.

c) Result in a cumulatively considerable net increase of any criteria pollutant for which the project region is non-attainment under an applicable federal or state ambient air quality standard (including releasing emissions which exceed quantitative thresholds for ozone precursors)?

Discussion/Explanation:

Less Than Significant Impact: Air quality emissions associated with the project include emissions of PM₁₀, NO_x and VOCs from construction/grading activities, as well as VOCs as the result of increase of traffic from operations at the facility. However, grading operations associated with the construction of the project would be subject to County of San Diego Grading Ordinance, which requires the implementation of dust control measures. Emissions from the construction phase would be minimal and localized, resulting in PM₁₀ and VOC emissions below the screening-level criteria established by SDAPCD Rule 20.2 and by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) CEQA air quality handbook section 6.2 and 6.3. The vehicle trips generated from the project will result in one (1) Average Daily Trips (ADT). According to the Bay Area Air Quality Management District CEQA Guidelines for Assessing the Air Quality Impacts of Projects and Plans, projects that generate less than 2,000 ADT are below the Screening-Level Criteria established by SDAPCD Rule 20.2 and by the SCAQMD CEQA air quality handbook section 6.2 and 6.3 for VOCs and PM₁₀.

In addition, a list of past, present and future projects within the surrounding area were evaluated and none of these projects emit significant amounts of criteria pollutants. Refer to XVII. Mandatory Findings of Significance for a comprehensive list of the projects considered. The proposed project as well as the past, present and future projects within the surrounding area, have emissions below the screening-level criteria established by SDAPCD Rule 20.2 and by the SCAQMD CEQA air quality handbook section 6.2 and 6.3, therefore, the construction and operational emissions associated with the proposed project are not expected to create a cumulatively considerable impact nor a considerable net increase of PM₁₀, or any O₃ precursors.

Less Than Significant Impact: Based a site visit conducted by Merry Tondro on August 13, 2007, no sensitive receptors have been identified within a quarter-mile (the radius determined by the SCAQMD in which the dilution of pollutants is typically significant) occur of the proposed project. generate significant levels of air pollutants. As such, the project will not expose sensitive populations to excessive levels of air pollutants.

No Impact: Based on an analysis of the County's Geographic Information System (GIS) records, the County's Comprehensive Matrix of Sensitive Species, site photos, and a site visit by Merry Tondro on August 13, 2007, staff has determined that although there are native vegetation communities or habitats exist on-site they will not be impacted by the proposed project. The proposed project will be placed in an area that is currently used as a vehicle turn-around for maintenance to the adjacent facility and is completely disturbed. The site also contains a boulder which will be removed. Therefore, the project will not have a substantial adverse effect on any candidate, sensitive, or special status species and would not contribute to cumulative impacts to these designated species.

Discussion/Explanation:

- The project will not result in unprotected erodible soils; will not alter existing drainage patterns; is not located in a floodplain, wetland, or significant drainage feature; and will not develop steep slopes.
- The project has prepared a Stormwater Management Plan dated October 26, 2006, certified by Roger Spencer. The plan includes the following Best Management Practices to ensure sediment does not erode from the project site: silt fencing; stockpile management; solid waste management; sandbag barrier; material delivery and storage and concrete waste management.
- The project involves minor grading. However, the project is required to comply with the San Diego County Code of Regulations, Title 8, Zoning and Land Use Regulations, Division 7, Sections 87.414 (DRAINAGE - EROSION PREVENTION) and 87.417 (PLANTING). Compliance with these regulations minimizes the potential for water and wind erosion.

Due to these factors, it has been found that the project will not result in substantial soil erosion or the loss of topsoil on a project level.

Potentially Significant Unless Mitigation Incorporated: One of the carriers which will be using the multi-carrier facility proposes to use 20 Northstar Lead Acid Batteries in their indoor radio cabinets which involves the routine use and storage of hazardous materials. However, the project will not result in a significant hazard to the public or environment because all storage, handling, transport, emission and disposal of hazardous substances will be in full compliance with local, State, and Federal regulations. California Government Code § 65850.2 requires that no final certificate of occupancy or its substantial equivalent be issued unless there is verification that the owner or authorized agent has met, or is meeting, the applicable requirements of the Health and Safety Code, Division 20, Chapter 6.95, Article 2, Section 25500-25520.

The San Diego County Department of Environmental Health Hazardous Materials Division (DEH HMD) is the Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA) for San Diego County responsible for enforcing Chapter 6.95 of the Health and Safety Code. As the CUPA, the DEH HMD is required to regulate hazardous materials business plans and chemical inventory, hazardous waste and tiered permitting, underground storage tanks, and risk management plans. The Hazardous Materials Business Plan is required to contain basic information on the location, type, quantity and health risks of hazardous materials stored, used, or disposed of on-site. The plan also contains an emergency response plan which describes the procedures for mitigating a hazardous release, procedures and equipment for minimizing the potential damage of a hazardous materials release, and provisions for immediate notification of the HMD, the Office of Emergency Services, and other emergency response personnel such as the local Fire Agency having jurisdiction. Implementation of the emergency response plan facilitates rapid response in the event of an accidental spill or release, thereby reducing potential adverse impacts. Furthermore, the DEH HMD is required to conduct ongoing routine inspections to ensure compliance with existing laws and regulations; to identify safety hazards that could cause or contribute to an accidental spill or release; and to suggest preventative measures to minimize the risk of a spill or release of hazardous substances.

Therefore, due to the strict requirements that regulate hazardous substances outlined above and the fact that the initial planning, ongoing monitoring, and inspections will occur in compliance with local, State, and Federal regulation; the project will not result in any potentially significant impacts related to the routine transport, use, and disposal of hazardous substances.

The emergency plan for the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station includes an emergency planning zone within a 10-mile radius. All land area within 10 miles of the plant is not within the jurisdiction of the unincorporated County and as such a project in the unincorporated area is not expected to interfere with any response or evacuation.

iii. OIL SPILL CONTINGENCY ELEMENT

No Impact: The Oil Spill Contingency Element will not be interfered with because the project is not located along the coastal zone or coastline.

iv. EMERGENCY WATER CONTINGENCIES ANNEX AND ENERGY SHORTAGE RESPONSE PLAN

No Impact: The Emergency Water Contingencies Annex and Energy Shortage Response Plan will not be interfered with because the project does not propose altering major water or energy supply infrastructure, such as the California Aqueduct.

General Plan – Noise Element

The County of San Diego General Plan, Noise Element, Policy 4b addresses noise sensitive areas and requires an acoustical study to be prepared for any use that may expose noise sensitive area to noise in excess of a Community Noise Equivalent Level (CNEL) of 60 decibels (dBA). Moreover, if the project is excess of CNEL 60 dB(A), modifications must be made to project to reduce noise levels. Noise sensitive areas include residences, hospitals, schools, libraries or similar facilities where quiet is an important attribute. Based on a Noise Analysis prepared by Eilar Associates and received on October 4, 2007, project implementation will not expose existing or planned noise sensitive areas to road, airport, heliport, railroad, industrial or other noise in excess of the CNEL 60 dB(A). Therefore, the project will not expose people to potentially significant noise levels that exceed the allowable limits of the County of San Diego General Plan, Noise Element.

Noise Ordinance – Section 36-404

Based on a Noise Analysis prepared by Eilar Associates and received on October 4 2007, non-transportation noise generated by the project is not expected to exceed the standards of the County of San Diego Noise Ordinance (Section 36-404) at or beyond the project's property line. The site is zoned A70 that has a one-hour nighttime average sound limit of 45 dBA. The adjacent properties are also zoned A70. Existing, on-site noise conditions, generated from an existing San Diego County wireless facility, produce noise levels that are saturated at 45 dBA along the northern and northwestern property line. Based on the noise report, calculations show that the proposed Vista Towers HVAC units and equipment cabinet noise levels will be as high as 26.4 dBA at the northern property line which is considered the worst case location. The Vista Towers facility alone will have insignificant noise contributions to the existing noise conditions. Therefore, with or without the existing noise conditions from the County wireless facility, the proposed Vista Towers project will comply with County Noise Ordinance, Section 36.404.

Noise Ordinance – Section 36-410

Based on a Noise Analysis prepared by Eilar Associates and received October 4, 2007, the project will not generate construction noise that may exceed the standards of the County of San Diego Noise Ordinance (Section 36-410). Construction operations will occur only during permitted hours of operation pursuant to Section 36-410. Also, It is not anticipated that the project will operate construction equipment in excess of an average sound level of 75dB between the hours of 7 AM and 7 PM.

Finally, the project's conformance to the County of San Diego General Plan (Noise Element, Policy 4b) and County of San Diego Noise Ordinance (Section 36-404 and 36.410) ensures the project will not create cumulatively considerable noise impacts, because the project will not exceed the local noise standards for noise sensitive areas; and the project will not exceed the applicable noise level limits at the property line or construction noise limits, derived from State regulation to address human health and quality of life concerns. Therefore, the project will not contribute to a cumulatively considerable exposure of persons or generation of noise levels in excess of standards established in the local general plan, noise ordinance, and applicable standards of other agencies.

The project was reviewed by DPW staff and was determined not to exceed a level of service (LOS) standard at the direct project level. Therefore, the project will not have a significant direct project-level impact on the LOS standards established by the County congestion management agency for designated roads or highways. (Cumulative impacts may not be less than significant)

However, the County of San Diego has developed an overall programmatic solution that addresses existing and projected future road deficiencies in the unincorporated portion of San Diego County. This program includes the adoption of a Transportation Impact Fee (TIF) program to fund improvements to roadways necessary to mitigate potential cumulative impacts caused by traffic from future development. This program is based on a summary of projections method contained in an adopted planning document, as referenced in the State CEQA Guidelines Section 15130 (b)(1)(B), which evaluates regional or area wide conditions contributing to cumulative transportation impacts. Based on SANDAG regional growth and land use forecasts, the SANDAG Regional Transportation Model was utilized to analyze projected build-out (year 2030) development conditions on the existing circulation element roadway network throughout the unincorporated area of the County. Based on the results of the traffic modeling, funding necessary to construct transportation facilities that will mitigate cumulative impacts from new development was identified. Existing roadway deficiencies will be corrected through improvement projects funded by other public funding sources, such as TransNet, gas tax, and grants. Potential cumulative impacts to the region's freeways have been addressed in SANDAG's Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). This plan, which considers freeway buildout over the next 30 years, will use funds from TransNet, state, and federal funding to improve freeways to projected level of service objectives in the RTP.

The proposed project generates an additional 0.1 ADT. These trips will be distributed on circulation element roadways in the unincorporated county that were analyzed by the TIF program, some of which currently or are projected to operate at inadequate levels of service. These project trips therefore contribute to a potential significant cumulative impact and mitigation is required. The potential growth represented by this project was included in the growth projections upon which the TIF program is based. In order to mitigate its incremental contribution to significant cumulative traffic impacts, the proposed project will pay the TIF prior to obtaining building permits. Therefore, payment of the TIF, which will be required at issuance of building permits, in combination with other components of the program described above, will mitigate potential cumulative traffic impacts to less than significant.
