

# Are you in the CITRUS QUARANTINE?

*A serious plant disease has been detected in California. It is fatal to citrus, and there is currently no cure. Until researchers find a solution, California residents and farmers must work together to protect citrus trees.*

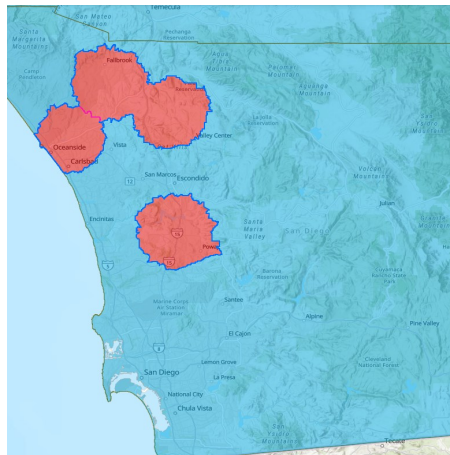
## What is Huanglongbing (HLB)/Citrus Greening?

- **Huanglongbing (HLB)** is a bacterial citrus disease vectored by the **Asian citrus psyllid (ACP)**
- Symptoms: blotchy, yellowing leaves; yellow shoots; lopsided, small & rancid-tasting fruit; and premature and excessive fruit drop.



## Where has HLB been found?

- Parts of Southern California including areas near **Fallbrook, Valley Center, Oceanside, and Rancho Bernardo**
- Florida, Texas, and other countries, including Mexico

## What's at risk? What can I do?

- HLB is deadly and currently has no cure
- All citrus tree varieties are at risk, including orange, lemon, lime, mandarin, grapefruit, and kumquat
- Infected trees will die and need to be removed from yards to protect your community's citrus and the local citrus industry.

- ☐ **Cooperate** with local officials
- ☐ **Don't move** citrus leaves, stems, plants, and debris
- ☐ **Remove** your citrus tree if you no longer care for it
