Master Gardeners are volunteers trained and supervised by the University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE). For 36 years the Master Gardener Volunteers have been providing free home gardening and pest control information to San Diego County residents. This extremely useful information is disseminated via the Master Gardener's hotline, information booths at local fairs and garden shows, walkins, mail and email. With more than 335 members, the Master Gardener program provide a wealth of up-to-date home horticulture information. The University of California 4-H Youth Development Program engages youth in reaching their fullest potential while advancing the field of youth development. Local Youth and Adult volunteers organize and facilitate 21 clubs along with 8 Military Youth Centers in the County of San Diego. The Expanded Food Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP), assists low-income youth and families with young children to acquire knowledge, skills, attitudes and behavior changes necessary to choose nutritionally sound diets and contribute to their personal development.

The Master Gardeners (MG's) mainly recruit through their many outreach events, the MG program held 60 "Ask a Master Gardener" booths throughout the county. This includes a daily presence at the San Diego County Fair and the annual Flower Fields at Carlsbad Ranch events. They have maintained their Earth Friendly Garden program for the past 8 years and offered 20 different classes and hands on workshops at their annual Spring Gardening Seminar. The 4-H program relies primarily on its large number of volunteers to distribute recruitment flyers and posters throughout their communities to find adult volunteers. Clubs also organize and attend community events to recruit volunteers and members. This year four special outreach efforts were conducted. For the first time Arts and Design Day was combined with the Food Challenge and Super Saturday at the Del Mar Fair Grounds making this quite a large event where the public can see that 4-H is more than just animals. The first was the Art and Design Day. This event is a competitive event where members display their projects and are interviewed by judges. The second is the Food Challenge. This event is also a competitive event where the members present their projects and are interviewed by the judges. The third is Super Saturday, where there were nine booths displaying 4-H projects from robotics to aquaponics to the public. The fourth event was an outreach booth at the San Diego County Fair. The public was invited to have a selfie picture taken with various animals and they received materials about the program. The Expanded Food Nutrition Education Program, attends collaborative meetings scheduled throughout the county, where educators exchange ideas on how best to reach their targeted demographics. Additionally, direct contact (phone or email) with local agencies and schools are initiated.

Please describe any special activities and/or achievements your program was involved in during the period of this report:

During the current program year, the Master Gardener program has developed a new offering titled Reminiscence Gardening. This committee works with memory care facilities and Alzheimer's San Diego to provide interactive workshops for individuals and their care-givers that are living with memory issues. Currently this committee is working with three facilities as well as Alzheimer's San Diego and they are conducting an average of 1-2 workshops per month. There are plans to add another 1-2 facilities within the next year. A group of 22, 4-H youth volunteers planned and conducted this years 4-H Junior Leadership Conference, which reached 90 middle school youth. Leadership skills were gained and members returned to their community clubs where they put these newly acquired skills to work. The Forensic Science Project, for youths ages 6-18, culminated in an FBI tour. The purpose was to introduce science in a real world, fun way to the youths. This year, the Expanded Food Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) collaborated with the Lemon Grove School District in San Diego and successfully recruited 11 new teachers, reaching over 300 students. Establishing this new partnership is helping EFNEP reach their target goal for youth enrollment. Adult EFNEP taught nutrition classes at two new school gardens, using the produce taken from the garden and incorporating it into their food demonstrations. In addition, a new relationship was established with the Boys and Girls club of National City which resulted in a group of 20 parents graduating and more classes scheduled in the fall. EFNEP was also acknowledged and received a Certificate of Recognition for outstanding community service by Senator Brian Jones. EFNEP staff successfully completed the ServSafe Food Protection Manager Certification Examination, which is accredited by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI)

# 8. VOLUNTEER PROGRAM GOALS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-19:

During the 2019-20 program year the UCCE San Diego County Master Gardener program will continue to expand their outreach efforts regarding accessible gardening in San Diego County. The Master Gardener's Community Gardens committee plans to continue assisting and supporting the 80+ community gardens in San Diego County in addition to continuing to work with more than 500 traditional school garden programs. The program will also be recruiting for and training its 20th class of Certified Master Gardener Volunteers. The 4-H Planning Board will be meeting to set a calendar of events that will include new events such as a Career Day and a Primary Field Day. We will be creating a county-wide Community Service Group that will be lead by 2 senior youth members. We will be re-establishing a County Teen Leadership group that will help expand our program into underserved communities and create exciting events for all members both youth and adult. The main goal is to have our program be more visible in the county and to grow our membership. The Expanded Food Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP), plans to continue to teach in school and community gardens throughout San Diego County and will focus on expanding the program into new school districts and community sites/clinics.
