Edible Food Recovery: Planning for Capacity (Section 18992.2.)

County of San Diego and the cities located within the county are each required to do the following for their jurisdiction:

✓ Estimate the amount of edible food that will be disposed by Tier 1 and 2 commercial edible food generators (absent new programs)

Tool addresses this step

✓ Identify existing capacity at food recovery organizations and services

✓ Identify, if any, the amount of new or expanded capacity needed

✓ Identify proposed new or expanded food recovery organizations and services that will be used

Edible Food Recovery: Program Implementation



Conduct education and outreach to all Tier 1 & Tier 2 commercial edible food generators



Increase commercial edible food generator access to food recovery organizations and food recovery services



Monitor edible food generator compliance and conduct enforcement.

- Monitoring and education begins in January 2022
- Local enforcement actions start January 2024



Increase edible food recovery capacity if the current capacity is not meeting the need.

Tool Methodology

- Identify generators and aggregate their business data by sector
- Review hauler account records, business license records, economic development data, food facility licensees from the health department, etc. to identify what records are readily available for food generating businesses
- Refer to "Business Data Needed" tab to identify information needed for each business sector of interest such as facility size, sales revenue, etc.

Identifying Tier 1 & Tier 2 Generators

Tier 1 - Must have program by January 1, 2022

- Supermarket, with gross annual sales of \$2,000,000 or more;
- Grocery store with a total facility size equal to or greater than 10,000 square feet;
- Food service provider;
- Food distributor;
- Wholesale food vendor.

Tier 2 - Must have program by January 1, 2024:

- Restaurant with 250 or more seats, or a total facility size equal to or greater than 5,000 square feet;
- Hotel with an on-site food facility and 200 or more rooms;
- Health facility with an on-site food facility and 100 or more beds;
- Large venue;
- Large event;
- > A state agency with a cafeteria with 250 or more seats or a total cafeteria facility size equal to or greater than 5,000 square feet;
- > A local education agency with an on-site food facility.

Step 1: Collecting Business Data

Jurisdictions need to identify Tier 1 & Tier 2 generators

MOST LABOR-INTENSIVE STEP!

Multiple avenues for collecting data:

- Purchased Business Lists
 - ► Hoovers (Dun & Bradstreet)
 - Spectrum (local firm)
- DEH Food Facility List
- Property/ real estate or leasing data
- ▶ Business License Data/Economic Development Data from your own jurisdiction's licenses or permits
- Web research
 - ► (https://dq.cde.ca.gov/dataquest/ (schools data)
 - https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CHCQ/LCP/CalHealthFind/Pages/SearchResult.aspx (healthcare facilities)
- ▶ All data probably won't be available from a single source, unfortunately.
- Process requires data crunching, general knowledge and confirming hunches.

Business Lists

- ▶ What to look for
 - ► Zip code or geographic boundary of jurisdiction
 - ► Caution if using zip codes that cross jurisdiction boundaries
 - Can confirm Address/ Jurisdiction using https://sdgis.sandag.org/ (ensur jurisdiction layer is on)
 - ▶ Planning and education requires ALL generators including military (federal), state agencies, schools, etc., even if jurisdiction won't be responsible for enforcement on all generators.
 - ► Food- Related Businesses
 - ► SIC or NAICS code query
 - Relevant data including employee #, facility square footage, sales volume, etc.



Tier 1 January 1, 2022

Supermarket

"Supermarket" means a full-line, self-service retail store with gross annual sales of two million dollars (\$2,000,000), or more, and which sells a line of dry grocery, canned goods, or nonfood items and some perishable items.

- > Purchased and/ or Business License Lists to Confirm
 - > Employee Size (for the County's tool)

- Supermarkets- National Chains, Local and Boutique Stores
- Wholesale/ Warehouse Stores (Costco, Sam's Club, etc)
- > Supercenters (Target, WalMart, etc)



Convenience Zone Status



- Supermarket is identified in the Progressive Grocer Marketing Guidebook.
- · Supermarket gross annual sales are \$2 million or more.
- Supermarket is considered a "full-line" store that sells a line of dry groceries, canned goods, or non-food items and perishable items.

Grocery store with a total facility size ≥ 10,000 square feet.

"Grocery store" means a store primarily engaged in the retail sale of canned food; dry goods; fresh fruits and vegetables; fresh meats, fish, and poultry; and any area that is not separately owned within the store where the food is prepared and served, including a bakery, deli, and meat and seafood departments

The definition lacks an "or"

Grocery store does not need to sell all of these types of items

- > Purchased and/ or Business License Lists
 - Confirm Facility Size
 - Employee Size (for the County's tool)

Food Service Provider

Food service provider means an entity primarily engaged in providing food services to institutional, governmental, commercial, or industrial locations of others based on contractual arrangements with these types of organizations

- > All Data Sources
 - > Central Production Kitchens
 - > Sites using 3rd party operators
- > Purchased and/ or Business License Lists
 - Employee Size (for the County's tool)
 - Total Employees or Food Service Employees only

Opportunity for Regional Collaboration!

For disposal estimation, only identify and include sites where the edible food is being generated (i.e., Culinart)


If FSP's production kitchen is in Escondido, Escondido includes that edible food in their disposal estimation.

Wholesale Food Vendor

"Wholesale food vendor" means a business or establishment engaged in the merchant wholesale distribution of food, where food (including fruits and vegetables) is received, shipped, stored, prepared for distribution to a retailer, warehouse, distributor, or other destination.

No threshold in definition




Food Distributor

"Food Distributor" means a company that distributes food to entities including, but not limited to, supermarkets and grocery stores

No threshold in definition

- > Purchased and/ or Business License Lists
 - > NAICS or SIC Codes
 - Employee Size (for the County's tool)
 - County's tool does NOT contain edible food recovery metric
- > DEH List
 - > Warehouse or food facility present







Tier 2 January 1, 2024

Restaurant w/ 250 or more seats, or a total facility size \geq 5,000 square feet.

"Restaurant" means an establishment primarily engaged in the retail sale of food and drinks for on-premises or immediate consumption.





Large Venue

"Large venue" means a permanent venue facility that annually seats or serves an average of more than 2,000 individuals within the grounds of the facility per day of operation of the venue facility.

For the purposes of this chapter, a venue facility includes, but is not limited to, a public, nonprofit, or privately owned or operated stadium, amphitheater, arena, hall, amusement park, conference or civic center, zoo, aquarium, airport, racetrack, horse track, performing arts center, fairground, museum, theater, or other public attraction facility. For the purposes of this chapter, a site under common ownership or control that includes more than one large venue that is contiguous with other large venues in the site, is a single large venue.

 - > Confirm onsite food facilities
- Purchased and/ or Business License Lists
 - > Employee Size (for the County's tool)
- > Economic or Tourism Data
 - Annual Visitors (for the County's tool)



Large Events

"Large event" means an event, including, but not limited to, a sporting event or a flea market, that charges an admission price, or is operated by a local agency, and serves an average of more than 2,000 individuals per day of operation of the event, at a location that includes, but is not limited to, a public, nonprofit, or privately owned park, parking lot, golf course, street system, or other open space when being used for an event.

Takeaways

- Start planning sooner than later
 - ► Edible Food Recovery Tools can help (County's or CalRecycle's)
- ► Recap Capacity Planning vs. Disposal Estimation
- Start identifying Tier 1 and Tier 2 generators in your jurisdiction
- Start identifying food recovery organizations and agencies in your jurisdiction
- ► Food recovery crosses jurisdictional boundaries. Ultimately, it's a regional issue.
 - ► Regional cooperation to identify cross-boundary capacity
 - Stay tuned for more guidance on templates and due dates

Takeaways

- ► Remember this presentation and tool was developed to the best of our interpretation and knowledge. CalRecycle is the authority on the definitions. As CalRecycle releases new clarification and guidance, and we all move forward in 1383, the methodology will likely improve!
- ▶ If in doubt or are unsure if a particular business is a Tier 1 or 2 Generator, include it and flag it to confirm later.
- ► This tool is a paper exercise. Audits, site visits and interviews with the facilities will yield the most accurate results.
- Some businesses may already have robust edible food recovery programs, especially chain supermarkets and grocery stores. Other grocers may not. The makeup of your jurisdiction is unique.
- ► The estimating tool really needs a sufficient sample size. The tool is not meant to estimate food disposed from any one business, but of a business sector. Use caution in inputting data into any tool.

HF&H Checklist For Edible Food Recovery

Edible Food Recovery

- Implement food recovery program that educates commercial edible food generators and increases access to food recovery programs (14 CCR 18991.1)
- Identify Tier One and Tier Two commercial edible food generators (14 CCR 18991.1)
- Increase edible food recovery capacity if current capacity is insufficient (14 CCR 18991.1)
- Prior to February 1, 2022, annually thereafter, maintain list of food recovery organizations/services (14 CCR 18985.2.a)
- Prior to February 1, 2022, annually thereafter, provide Tier One/Tier Two commercial edible food generators with information on their requirements, food recovery programs, and food recovery organizations/services (14 CCR 18985.2.b)
