- ii. Presentation: San Diego County Emergency Operations Plan Update by Nick Zubel, Senior Emergency Services Coordinator, and Myla Barker, Emergency Services Coordinator
 - i Overview: The County's Office of Emergency Services will provide a presentation on the County's Emergency Operations Plan update. The

Emergency Operations Plan is a comprehensive guide that details how the region will respond to major emergencies and disasters. As part of the update process, the County is committed to engaging food system stakeholders to ensure the plan addresses food insecurity considerations.

 - a) I Love to Glean – Jurisdictions should come to together to discuss and define what it means to have a food emergency. Those areas affected by the 2023 floods are 51% insecure.
 - b) HF&H Consultants – Southern regions of the County do not currently have a hub that can take in food (i.e. lack of infrastructure). Will this plan simplify bureaucratic process for feeding agencies?
 - i County of San Diego Office of Emergency Services – Planning for workshops and tabletop exercises (community engagement efforts). Your feedback/expertise informs the plan.
 - ii County of San Diego Office of Emergency Services – Multi-jurisdictional hazardous plan updates: Identifies vulnerabilities and potential hazards with annual and 5-year updates.
- iii. Presentation: ProduceGood Operational Update by Kiyonna Navarro, Program Manager

 - a) City of Encinitas – Between volunteers and drivers, is there one that ProduceGood especially needs help with?
 - i ProduceGood – Individuals that are comfortable being the lead for grocery gleaning and picking events. ProduceGood would provide equipment, materials, and contacts.

3. SB 1383 – Implementation, Discussion, Q&A

- a. Enforcement Plans/Process
 - i. Solana Center for Environmental Innovation – Wanted to follow up regarding meeting with CalRecycle on jurisdictions providing grace periods to generators regarding enforcement.
 - i CalRecycle – Since the regulations do not mention or define grace

periods, CalRecycle cannot necessarily weigh in on the matter. Grace periods should not be used to indefinitely prolong enforcement timelines.

- ii. Solana Center for Environmental Innovation – If a business reaches the Notice of Violation (NOV) stage of the enforcement timeline but is actively working towards compliance, can a city withhold issuing a NOV?
 - i. CalRecycle – Jurisdiction need to follow their enforcement plan regardless of the business’ efforts. Regulations do not include a “good faith clause,” and would therefore need to continue with enforcement rather than prolong enforcement to allow for generators to get into compliance.
 - ii. County of San Diego Public Works – From our team’s experience, it’s not uncommon for businesses to begin steps towards compliance on the 59th day. With our program, we’ve tended to continue with the enforcement process regardless of progress being made.
- iii. County of San Diego Public Works – Spoke with CalRecycle regarding a Starbucks’ location stating that all Starbucks nationwide received exemption from edible food recovery requirements from CalRecycle.
 - i. CalRecycle – Typically, CalRecycle does not issue waivers or exemptions to generators. CalRecycle only is involved with non-local entities. Also, a reminder to jurisdictions that there are no edible food recovery exemptions under SB 1383.
 - a) County of San Diego Public Works – For non-local entities that do apply for an exemption, would jurisdictions be notified?
 - i. CalRecycle – CalRecycle staff communicating with non-local entities should be involving jurisdictional contacts. Feel free to contact Emily Schuetz at Emily.Schuetz@CalRecycle.ca.gov with any questions.
 - ii. CalRecycle – If it helps, CalRecycle staff can run a report, upon request, to provide a list of current entities with CalRecycle waivers on file.
 - ii. Feeding San Diego – Jessica Schultz is the new Director of Supply Chain for Feeding San Diego. Happy to chat with jurisdictions regarding this issue in case it involves our FoodShare rescue program with Starbucks.
 - ii. Life Acts – Is there a person or place where people can report generators that are actively throwing away food?
 - i. County of San Diego Public Works – People can reach out to local jurisdictional contacts, food bank contacts (if a partner agency), file a complaint through CalRecycle’s complaint portal ([Recycling Services and Edible Food Collection Complaints - CalRecycle Home Page](#)), etc.
- b. Site Visits/Inspections – DEHQ Myths and Challenges
 - i. Solana Center for Environmental Innovation – Encountered a Panera Bread

- that met Tier 2 qualifications, spoke with corporate and had a constructive conversation and corporate understands that any other locations over the 5,000 SQFT threshold will move forward with edible food recovery.
- ii. County of San Diego Public Works – The County has collaborated with the Department of Environmental Health & Quality (DEHQ), Watershed Protection Program (WPP), and California Restaurant Association (CRA) to create a guidance document o managing organic waste. Joshua Keyton an Julia Gallaway will be presenting the guide to the public at an upcoming DEHQ meeting on August 21.
 - iii. Solana Center for Environmental Innovation – Does the guide cover the topics of rats and other vermin?
 - i County of San Diego Public Works – Yes, the DEHQ has provided a lot of guidance on pest and vermin which were incorporated into this guide.
 - c. Food Recovery Organization Site Visits
 - i. Solana Center for Environmental Innovation – Do jurisdictions have any examples of Food Recovery Organizations (FROs) successfully working with restaurants?
 - i County of San Diego Public Works – Some of our FROs works with local restaurants to recover excess edible food (typically breakfast items and fried chicken) through Food Donation Connection. Those food items are sometimes repackaged into meal kits that are provided to local schools.
 - d. Recordkeeping & Reporting (FRO’s and Generators)
 - a. Other roadblocks, concerns for discussion – none
 - i Jurisdictions discussed vetting process for Food Recovery Organizations (FROs).

National

- a. **[HFFI Food Access and Retail Expansion Fund \(HFFI FARE Fund\):](#)**
 - i. Eligible applicant entities include for-profit business enterprises (including a corporation, limited liability company, sole proprietor, public benefit corporation); cooperatively owned businesses; tax-exempt nonprofit corporations; institutions of higher education; state and local governments and governmental agencies, authorities, commissions and food policy councils; tribal governments and tribal governmental agencies, authorities, and food policy councils.
 - ii. The HFFI FARE Fund could assist a variety of organizations, business models, and capital needs of ventures that process, distribute, aggregate, market, and sell healthy, fresh, and affordable foods to underserved communities and markets.
 - iii. Multiple rounds of grant application deadlines **12/12/2024, 05/01/2025, and 10/02/2025**. Loans and technical assistance funding inquiry forms accepted on a rolling basis.

Local

- a. **Efficient Refrigeration Program (Farms Eligible!)**
 - i. San Diego Community Power is offering free energy-efficient refrigerators and freezers to help local corner stores, small businesses, and nonprofits stock California-grown produce, dairy, meat, eggs, and culturally appropriate foods. This initiative supports energy savings and access to fresh, healthy foods in low-income and low-food-access areas.
