Our San Luis Rey Watershed



Watersheds are land areas that drain water through streams, lakes and rivers to a common low point – usually the ocean.

We rely on our watershed more than you might think.

Whenever we picnic at Guajome Park, camp at Lake Henshaw, or simply take a sip of water, we are using our watershed's resources.



The San Luis Rey Watershed is 1 of 11 watersheds within San Diego County. The San Luis Rey Watershed begins in the mountains of east San Diego County near Warner Springs and drains all the way to the Pacific Ocean near Oceanside. If you live within this watershed, actions you take at your home and within your community can help improve the water quality in our rivers, lakes, and ocean.

We Can Protect Our Watersheds with Just a Few Steps!

The water that flows through our watershed picks up pollutants like bacteria, and trash, which can contaminate our waterways. **The top priority in the San Luis Rey Watershed is preventing bacteria pollution, like pet waste for example.** As residents, it is up to us to keep it clean. Every individual action can add up to big changes.

You can help protect our watershed by taking these simple actions to prevent pollution:



Bacteria | *found in waste and sewage*

- Keep your yard free of pet waste. Carry bags when walking your pet and properly dispose of their waste in designated containers.
- Take care of your sewer or septic system. Report sewage leaks or spills immediately to 858-505-6657.
- Properly dispose of RV sewage at a designated dump station.



Trash | *including green waste*

- Throw all trash away in designated containers and keep the lids closed.
