Watersheds are land areas that drain water through streams, lakes and rivers to a common low point – usually the ocean.

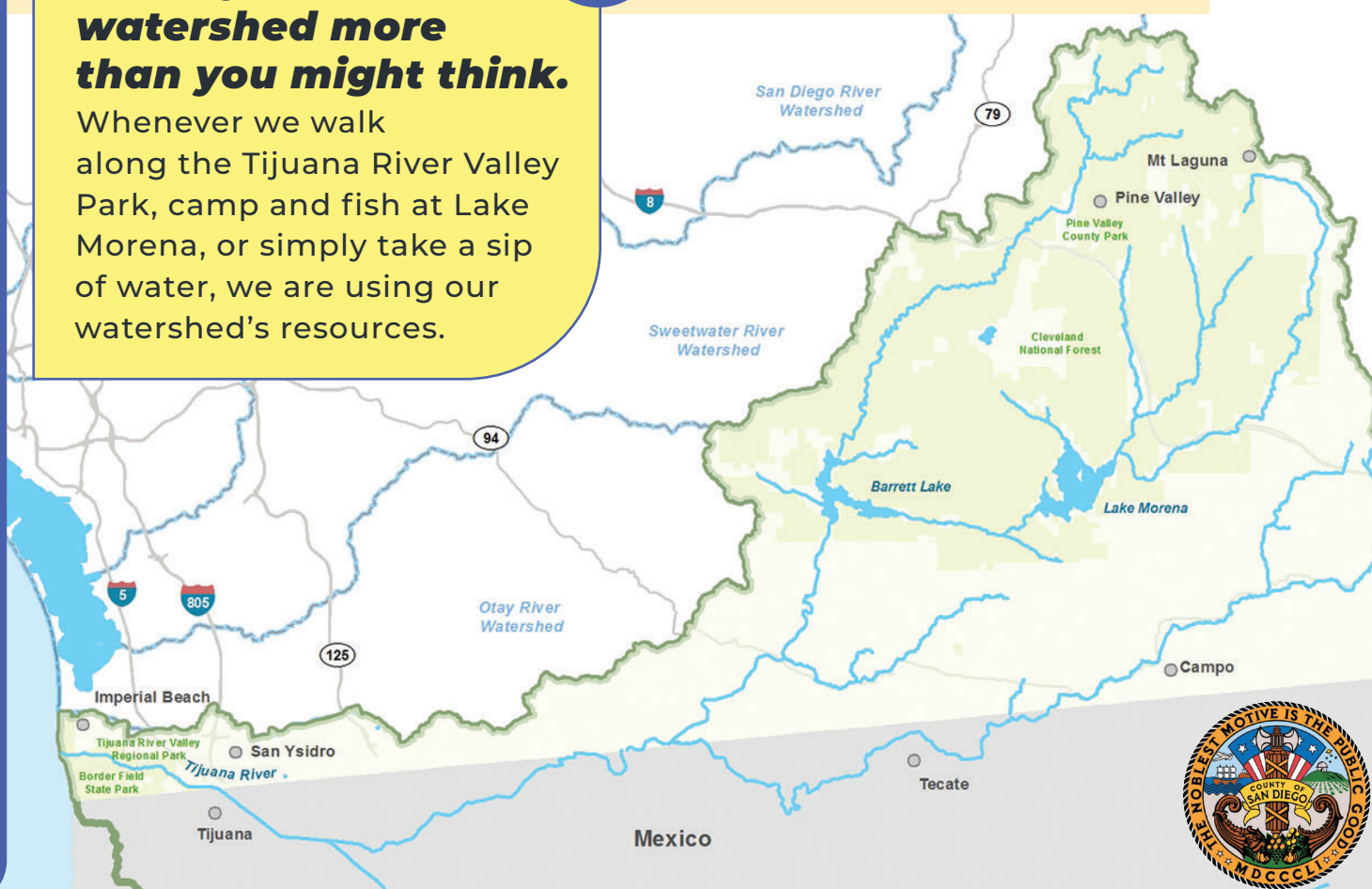
The Tijuana Watershed is 1 of 11 watersheds within San Diego County. The Tijuana Watershed begins in the mountains near Mount Laguna. Water then flows into Mexico before returning to San Diego County, where it reaches the Pacific Ocean south of Imperial Beach. If you live within this watershed, actions you take at your home and within your community can help improve the water quality in our rivers, lakes, and ocean.

We rely on our watershed more than you might think.

Whenever we walk along the Tijuana River Valley Park, camp and fish at Lake Morena, or simply take a sip of water, we are using our watershed's resources.

We Can Protect Our Watersheds with Just a Few Steps!

The water that flows through our watershed picks up pollutants like sediment, bacteria, and trash, which can contaminate our waterways. **The top priority in the Tijuana Watershed is preventing sediment pollution, like dirt and soil.** As residents, it is up to us to keep it clean. Every individual action can add up to big changes.

You can help protect our watershed by taking these simple actions to prevent pollution:



Sediment | dirt and soil

- Sweep your driveway or porch instead of using a hose. Dispose of debris in a designated container.
- Use mulch or gravel in landscaped areas to prevent erosion and save water.



Bacteria | found in waste and sewage

- Keep your yard free of pet waste. Carry bags when walking your pet and properly dispose of their waste in designated containers.
- Take care of your sewer or septic system. Report sewage leaks or spills immediately to 858-505-6657.
- Properly dispose of RV sewage at a designated dump station.



Trash | including green waste

- Throw all trash away in designated containers and keep the lids closed.
