
Public Health Declares Hepatitis A Outbreak in Los Angeles County

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has declared a community-wide outbreak of hepatitis A following a sustained increase in clinical cases and elevated virus levels detected in local wastewater. Public Health confirmed 165 hepatitis A cases in LA County since 2024, which is three times the number of cases reported in 2023. Although unhoused individuals are at higher risk for contracting hepatitis A infection because they often have limited access to handwashing and toileting facilities, of the 29 hepatitis A cases confirmed to date in 2025, most have been among people without travel or housing risk factors. This increase in hepatitis A infections among people without risk factors has corresponded with recent increases in hepatitis A wastewater concentrations. While the risk to the general public remains low, community-wide protection actions are needed to ensure that transmission of hepatitis A is reduced.

Vaccination and good hygiene are the best ways to prevent hepatitis A.

"The ongoing increase in hepatitis A cases signals that quick action is needed to protect public health," said Muntu Davis, MD, MPH, Los Angeles County Health Officer. "The hepatitis A vaccine is safe, effective, and offers long-term protection. Getting vaccinated is simple, and it's one of the most important things you can do for your own health and the health of our entire community. It is also important for residents to wash their hands with soap and water regularly and especially before eating and preparing food and after using the bathroom."












Outbreak-associated Hepatitis A cases by onset week 11/1/2016-8/01/2017, N = 297*



IDENTIFY/IMMUNIZE

SYMPTOMATIC SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- Nausea
- Anorexia
- Fever
- Malaise
- Abdominal pain
- Jaundice
- Elevated serum aminotransferase levels

ASYMPTOMATIC* EXPOSURE HISTORY

- Household or sexual contact with an infected person
- Ingestion of contaminated food or water
- Travel to countries with high rates of endemic infection
- Provide postexposure prophylaxis (vaccination and/or IG) within 2 weeks of exposure
- Offer ED vaccination to populations at risk: homeless, illicit drug users (injection and non-injection), men who have sex with men



- Observe standard precautions
- Observe contact precautions when caring for incontinent and diapered patients
- Observe hand hygiene with soap and water; wash hands for at least 10-20 seconds
- Patients should avoid work in food preparation, healthcare and child care until two weeks after symptom onset
- Confirm diagnosis with serum IgM testing



Report immediately to

- Local Health Department
- Hospital Infection Control
- * Patients are contagious prior to symptom onset
- "Immunocompromised patients, children aged less than 12 months, patients with chronic liver disease and patients with an allergy to the vaccine or vaccine component should be treated with IG. Per CDC, treatment with IG rather than the vaccine is also preferred for all patients over the age of 40.

H5 Bird Flu: Current Situation

WHAT TO KNOW

- H5 bird flu is widespread in wild birds worldwide and is causing outbreaks in poultry and U.S. dairy cows with several recent human cases in U.S. dairy and poultry workers.
- While the current public health risk is low, CDC is watching the situation carefully and working with states to monitor people with animal exposures.
- CDC is using its flu surveillance systems to monitor for H5 bird flu activity in people.





H5N1 (Bird Flu) (Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza)

HPAI is different from seasonal flu

Suspect in a dairy farm worker with flu-like symptoms, especially conjunctivitis



Proposed Federal Legislation (H.R. 3443 introduced May 15)

MEDS Bill focuses on three main areas

- Assessment of the value of EMS physician medical direction
- Availability of essential medications and blood products for EMS patients
- Transparency of wall times at hospitals during transfer of care
- H.R.3443 119th Congress (2025-2026): To amend title XI of the Social Security Act to create a model, and to direct the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission to carry out a study and report with respect to Medicare payment for emergency medical services. | Congress.gov | Library of Congress
