

RECEIVE UPDATE ON THE AGING ROADMAP (DISTRICTS: ALL)

OVERVIEW

There are approximately 959,000 San Diegans over the age of 55, and by 2030, that number is expected to grow to more than 1.1 million. San Diego County's over-85 population is projected to diversify and grow more than any other age group. Thus, it is crucial that we take the needs of our region's older adults into account as we plan for the future. Launched at the direction of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors (Board) on September 24, 2019 (04), the Aging Roadmap is the County of San Diego's (County) plan to ensure that the region has communities and programs that equitably support the needs and celebrate the contributions of the growing population of older adults in the San Diego region. The Aging Roadmap serves as the County's framework for aging and identifies goals and action steps in ten priority areas:

- Health & Community Support
- Housing
- Social Participation
- Transportation
- Dementia
- Caregiver Support
- Safety
- Preparedness & Response
- The Silver Economy
- Medical & Social Services

This annual report provides an update on Aging Roadmap progress and accomplishments. It also describes activities in the past fiscal year to engage older adults and older adult service providers in updating the Aging Roadmap goals to further advance equity in aging. For each of the ten priority areas, the report describes accomplishments and next steps towards reaching the vision for that area.

Today's action requests the Board receive the third annual report of the Aging Roadmap. This action supports the County's *Live Well San Diego* vision by supporting older adults and persons

with disabilities to live healthy, safe, and thriving lives and helping to ensure a community that is livable for people of all ages. The Aging Roadmap aligns with and supports the Board's Framework for Our Future by actively working on assessing and improving equity across Aging Roadmap programs and services to ensure equity for people of all ages to include black, indigenous, and people of color, women, people with disabilities, immigrants, and the LGBTQ community.

RECOMMENDATION(S) CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

1. Receive update on the Aging Roadmap.

EQUITY IMPACT STATEMENT

Principles of equity are incorporated across all ten Aging Roadmap priority areas. Recognizing the diversity of San Diego County's population, the Aging Roadmap represents a commitment to ensuring that all residents can age well while accessing needed services. Equity continues to be prioritized in all aspects of program planning, community engagement, and service accessibility. In the past year, discussions and events focused on equity and reaching diverse audiences. An "Aging + Equity" Virtual Workshop was hosted in partnership with County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency, Aging & Independence Services (AIS), the Office of Equitable Communities, the Department of Human Resources, and the AIS Advisory Council, among others. The event offered simultaneous oral translation in English, Spanish, and Arabic so participants of various languages could engage in meaningful discussions in real time. This event is an example of how to advance equity and weave equity, diversity, and inclusion into all ten Aging Roadmap priority areas by providing a safe and inclusive space for people of all backgrounds to participate. Moving forward, community partners will continue to be closely involved in these conversations and an equity lens will be applied to planning specific programs across the Aging Roadmap priority areas. To ensure that AIS is sufficiently meeting the needs of the community, AIS will continue to seek community input and feedback to promote collaboration between the County, community organizations and members of the public. It is anticipated that these actions will have a positive impact on equity-seeking groups of all ages to include, black, indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC), women, people with disabilities, immigrants, and the LGBTO+ community.

SUSTAINABILITY STATEMENT

The Aging Roadmap represents the County of San Diego's comprehensive system of care, including person-centered and community-wide efforts. Improving and expanding programs and services that improve the safety and welfare of older adults and persons with disabilities will contribute to County of San Diego Sustainability Goals: engage the community; provide just and equitable access to County services; and promote health and wellbeing. The Aging Roadmap considers the unique needs of older adults and how environmental factors, such as extreme heat and fires, can impact this population more severely because of challenges like limited mobility and increased frailty. The Aging Roadmap will continue to elevate the needs and consideration of older adults in the region's discussions and plans for sustainability, to ensure residents can thrive in a safe, healthy, and inclusive environment.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with the proposed action. There will be no change in net General Fund costs and no additional staff years.

ADVISORY BOARD STATEMENT

The Aging & Independence Services Advisory Council reviewed this item at their regular meeting on September 12, 2022, and recommended .

BACKGROUND

The Aging Roadmap serves as a guide for the future of aging in the San Diego region. It was developed through input and information gathered from hundreds of older adults during community assessments and stakeholder interviews. It builds upon excellent work already underway and allows for innovation, flexibility, and coordination to meet current and future regional needs. The Aging Roadmap was launched on September 24, 2019 (4), when the San Diego County Board of Supervisors (Board) directed County of San Diego (County) staff to implement the Aging Roadmap in partnership with community-based organizations, hospital partners, and the County departments of Aging & Independence Services, Planning & Development Services, Public Health Services, Housing and Community Development Services, Public Works, the Sheriff's Department, the District Attorney, and the Office of Emergency Services.

The Aging Roadmap identifies specific goals and action steps in ten priority areas:

- Health & Community Support
- Housing
- Social Participation
- Transportation
- Dementia
- Caregiver Support
- Safety
- Preparedness & Response
- The Silver Economy
- Medical & Social Services

The Aging Roadmap is the product of multiple phases of community input and collaboration. In 2016, the community provided input and selected the first five priority areas listed above to comprise Age Well San Diego, the County's AARP® age-friendly initiative, approved by the Board on May 15, 2018 (6). Teams of community members, experts, and County staff were created to develop and implement goals in each of the five priority areas; these five teams, led by community members, continue to meet and achieve goals. In 2019, the Aging Roadmap was conceptualized as a broader framework to encompass all County programs for older adults and individuals with disabilities. Additional community input was garnered, and the remaining five priority areas were identified, completing the Aging Roadmap's ten priority areas.

In 2020, the Aging Roadmap was adopted as the organizational framework for San Diego County's 2020-2024 Area Plan. The Area Plan, a California Department of Aging (CDA) requirement, is the primary document by which Area Agencies on Aging provide a four-year plan of services and program execution of the critical responsibilities addressing present and future aging and long-term care issues within California. As part of the development of the Area Plan, County staff solicited community input through countywide public feedback forums; this feedback was integrated into the Area Plan and now informs various County programs and the direction of the Aging Roadmap.

In Spring of 2022, several opportunities were presented to capture the voices of community stakeholders, older adults, and caregivers, including:

- Collaborative threading meetings across County departments to ensure continuous collaboration, information sharing, and alignment of efforts.
- Input sessions with the Caregiver Coalition of San Diego to further understand current, new, and emerging issues affecting caregivers throughout the region.
- Community listening sessions with monolingual older adults participating in the Elder Multicultural Access and Support Services program. Languages included Spanish, Arabic, and Tagalog.

Using information gained from the input above, Aging Roadmap partners participated in Action Planning workshops to identify goals and strategies for the future to reflect new, emerging priorities that include greater emphasis on equity and aging. Since the launch of the Aging Roadmap, community input and impactful partnerships have advanced current programming and supported the development of new programs, projects, and services to address current and anticipated long-term needs of older adults. Opportunities for more community input on Aging Roadmap efforts will be facilitated through the 2024-2028 Area Plan Public Feedback Forums that are planned for 2023.

The Aging Roadmap & COVID-19

The Aging Roadmap is designed to be flexible to address emerging needs with appropriate adaptations to policy and service delivery goals. This flexibility has been necessary during the COVID-19 pandemic, when older adults and individuals with disabilities confronted new and evolving needs across all ten Aging Roadmap priority areas. In addition to the adaptations due to COVID-19, there is much to celebrate as goals were achieved across all priority areas. The 2022 Aging Roadmap Annual Update Report details the successes to date and demonstrates how collaborations across multiple sectors can result in significant progress. Special thanks are given to the community partners, many dedicated County staff, and diverse organizations who have contributed time and expertise to this effort. With the continued support of the Board, the Aging Roadmap can become a model for age-friendly communities and aging services across the country.

Next Steps

Building age-friendly communities requires sustained efforts, and the Aging Roadmap provides the blueprint for the work ahead. Goals and priorities will continue to be adaptable and responsive to community needs, including challenges associated with COVID-19 and issues of equity, social isolation, access to technology, food security, affordable housing, and safe transportation. Progress will continue by strengthening cross-departmental relationships to help older adults age in place

and identifying emerging opportunities to expand inclusive programming for all ages, abilities, and zip codes. Within the Aging Roadmap, community involvement will continue through work conducted in partnership with community teams and development of the 2024-2028 Area Plan, ensuring that the community's voice is well-represented and included.

LINKAGE TO THE COUNTY OF SAN DIEGO STRATEGIC PLAN

Today's proposed action supports the County of San Diego's 2022-27 Strategic Plan Initiatives of Sustainability (Resiliency), Equity (Health), and Community (Quality of Life), and the regional *Live Well San Diego* vision by strengthening the system of care for older adults and ensuring a community that is livable for residents of all ages.

The Aging & Independence Services Advisory Council

The Council's Role

The Advisory Council (Council) for the County of San Diego (County) Health and Human Services Agency, Aging & Independence Services (AIS) operates in accordance with the duties and responsibilities defined in the provisions of Title III of the Older Americans Act of 1965, the Mello-Granlund Older Californians Act Section 9402, and the San Diego County Code of Administrative Ordinances Article IIIa. The Council's primary responsibility is to:

"...advise continuously the area agency on aging on all matters relating to the development of the area plan, the administration of the plan and operations conducted under the plan;"

The Council's Operational Activities

The Council holds regular public meetings on the second Monday of each month from 12 p.m. to 2 p.m. In Fiscal Year 2021-22, all meetings were held virtually in accordance with the continuance of teleconferencing meeting option pursuant to Government Code section 54953(e), which allows local agencies to continue to meet via teleconference as long as they verify every 30 days that the exemption from traditional teleconference requirements is still necessary. The Council has 30 seats, ten of which are appointed by members of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors. As of the regular council meeting on July 11, 2022, 25 seats were filled. Council members and AIS staff have continued outreach efforts to fill vacant seats.

In Fiscal Year 2021-22, members reviewed and evaluated needs to ensure a strong and vital aging system. Monthly Council meetings featured several AIS program staff members who provided operational updates and in-depth overviews of AIS programs. The Council also heard from representatives from several other County departments including County Counsel, Agency Budget Office, and the Department of Homeless Solutions & Equitable Communities who provided relevant updates and information pertaining to AIS operations and support of older adults in the county. While off-site meetings and tours were not possible due to COVID-19, the Council and subcommittees continued to be engaged with local organizations and heard from several speakers including the Office of the State of Long-Term Care Ombudsman, Southern Caregiver Resource Center, San Diego Oasis, Alzheimer's San Diego, and Neighborhood Healthcare who provided insight into issues impacting the region and programs and services available to older adults. These speakers helped Council members remain

informed of current needs, resources, and trends as they provided guidance on items related to the local aging system prior to these items going before the San Diego County Board of Supervisors.

Launched at the direction of the Board of Supervisors on September 24, 2019, the Aging Roadmap is the County's plan to ensure that the region has communities and programs that support the needs and celebrate the contributions of the growing population of older adults in the San Diego region. In 2020, the Aging Roadmap was adopted as the organizational framework for AIS' Area Plan 2020-2024, which identifies the priorities and direction for County activities on behalf of older adults. The Aging Roadmap includes community teams working toward an age-friendly region. The Roadmap's priority areas include health and community support, housing, social participation, transportation, dementia, caregiver support, safety, preparedness and response, the silver economy, and the medical and social services system. Council members continued to provide support to the Aging Roadmap initiatives and had representation on all five Age Well San Diego theme teams. Council members also participated on seven community-based workgroups in order to provide auxiliary representation in support of stated initiatives and objectives. In May 2022, the Council held elections to appoint representatives from the region to the California Senior Legislature, a nonpartisan volunteer body whose primary mission is to gather ideas for legislation at the state and federal levels, develop and prioritize formal proposals to present to members of the Legislature or the Congress, and to advocate for laws implementing the ideas.

Fiscal Year 2021-22 Accomplishments

In Fiscal Year 2021-22, efforts continued toward strengthening the aging network in our region. The Council conducts a considerable amount of work through committees, and the committees were engaged and impactful in supporting the work of the Council.

Standing Subcommittee

Executive & Membership

The Executive & Membership Subcommittee continued to perform internal organizational functions including recruiting and recommending new members and reviewing and maintaining Council records. The subcommittee also set Council meeting agendas, strengthened the focus on strategic planning and goals, encouraged subcommittee development of position papers, and secured speakers for Council meetings to support Council goals.

Ancillary Subcommittees

Healthy Aging

The Healthy Aging Subcommittee aims to expand current programs, develop new, evidence-based communitywide programs, and promote preventative measures to eliminate or reduce the impact of disease and chronic disabilities. In 2022, the subcommittee reviewed San Diego County demographic data and constructed a white paper titled, "Seniors Who Live Alone in San Diego County." Expertise from subcommittee members, Tierrasanta Villages, and Ph.D. Professors from UCSD Department of Psychiatry contributed to the white paper.

Housing

The Housing Subcommittee continued to research and monitor issues and trends related to the adaptability and accessibility aspects of aging in place within age-friendly communities. These topics included affordable housing for older adults and strategies for safe options for older adults facing housing insecurity. The subcommittee met with community housing agencies and learned about current housing programs and issues impacting residents countywide.

Long Term Care Ombudsman & Facilities

The Long-Term Care Ombudsman & Facilities Subcommittee monitored legislative proposals and changes related to skilled nursing facilities and residential care facilities for the elderly, and proposed AIS program improvements, including effective outreach, education, and training and better outcomes for residents and providers. The

subcommittee met with the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Director and their senior staff and learned about priorities of the new leadership. The subcommittee also established closer communication with Choose Well administrators, focused on opportunities to leverage & coordinate with Choose Well's social media footprint, outreach programs, and resources to engage long-term care facilities' providers and residents.

Nutrition

The Nutrition Subcommittee ensured that the Council was informed in delivery of AIS nutrition services contracts, site responsiveness to AIS performance standards and community participation. The AIS Public Health Nutrition Manager became a regular participant in the Nutrition Subcommittee and the subcommittee learned about the importance of specific nutrient requirements for older adults and those living with chronic conditions. Presentations from community agencies and medical and academic experts from UCSD Department of Public Health and SDSU School of Exercise and Nutrition provided the subcommittee with a better understanding of nutrient-dense foods essential for health and bone density as we age. The subcommittee prepared a position paper on the importance of nutrition for older adults and acknowledged the variety of AIS programs and services focused on nutrition and health promotion.

Ad Hoc Subcommittees

Area Plan

The ad hoc Area Plan Subcommittee advised on the development and annual update of the 2020-24 Area Plan, a California Department of Aging (CDA) requirement which provides a four-year plan of services and execution of the critical responsibilities addressing present and future aging and long-term care issues within San Diego County.

Budget

The ad hoc Budget Subcommittee reviewed the Fiscal Year 2022-23 proposed budget and made recommendations to staff regarding content and format and provided input into the presentation of the proposed budget to the Council.

Legislative

The ad hoc Legislative Subcommittee advised on the County of San Diego's 2022 Legislative Program.

Nominating

The ad hoc Nominating Subcommittee recommended a slate of officers for the Fiscal Year 2022-23 officer elections.
