**CSOC Council Vision:** San Diego youth are healthy, safe, successful in school, and in their transition to adulthood, while being law abiding, while living in a home and community that supports strong family connections.

Mission: The purpose of the System of Care Council is to ensure that all agencies serving San Diego county youth from age 0 through age 21 have coordinated services resulting in improved youth and family, and system outcomes consistent with System of Care Values and Principles.

- Collaboration of four sectors: The cornerstone of the CSOC is a strong four sectors partnership between youth/families, public agencies, private organizations and education that ensure accountability to achieve System of Care (SOC) goals and quality outcomes consistent with SOC philosophy.
- 2. <u>Integrated:</u> Among the four sector partners services are comprehensive, accessible coordinate behavioral and physical health care, provide seamless transition of care and utilize natural community supports,
- 3. Youth guided, family driven: Youth and families actively participate in service delivery, planning, and program and policy development.
- 4. <u>Individualized:</u> Services are flexible and designed to meet and build upon the unique needs, strengths and potential of each youth, and family.

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- 5. <u>Strength-based:</u> Individualized plans and services identify and utilize youth/family strengths to facilitate health and wellness.
- 6. <u>Community-based:</u> Sector partners offer an array of services in each region and strengthen family and youth connections to neighborhood and local community resources.
- 7. <u>Outcome driven:</u> Service delivery systems continuously improve services by measuring and evaluating outcomes and use results to modify practices.
- 8. <u>Culturally Competent:</u> Service providers honor the diversity of cultures; address the complexities within and between cultures, and provide accessible and relevant services.
- 9. <u>Trauma Informed:</u> Sector partners recognize that trauma and chronic stress influence coping strategies and behavior, respond with compassion, and commit to the prevention of re-traumatization and the promotion of self-care and resilience.

Hepatitis A Status update and information- (Handouts)

The outbreak within the county continues and 516 cases as of the end of October 2017 and 20 deaths have been reported. Vaccinations are available throughout the county.     - o It was noted that on Table 8: Behavioral Health Programs (page 34), Aurora Behavioral Health is listed as a program that provides inpatient services, but Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Service (CAPS), and Sharp Mesa Vista were not included.

#### IV. Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) - Update (Adrienne Yancey)

- BHS Annual Forums
  - ✓ The MHSA team finalized the Community Engagement process at the end of September 2017. BHS hosted two public forums in the month of August 2017, one in North Region (August 10, 2017) and one in the Central Regions (August 29, 2017).
  - ✓ The following Focus Groups were held:
    - Direct services staff
    - Transition Age Youth (TAY)
    - Clients/Consumers: 100 Club members participated at Clubhouses via telephone (10 members for each clubhouse).
    - Re-Entry population
    - o Homeless population with Serious Mental Illness (SMI).
  - ✓ An online "Telephone Town Hall" was also held.
  - Over 400 individuals participated in this Community Engagement process, 220 of the total participated in the public forums. Results of these activities will be included in the Fiscal Year 2018-19 yearly update to the Mental Health Services Oversight and Advisory Commission (MHSOAC).
- Revenue and Expenditure Report
   State policy requires the County of the County

State policy requires the County of San Diego to post for public review the MHSA Annual Revenue and Expenditure Report (RER). The report shows annual expenditures for all MHSA components. - MHSA Three Year Plan/Board of Supervisors (BOS) Approval
   The MHSA Three Year Program and Expenditure Plan for Fiscal Year 2017-18 was approved by the BOS on October 10, 2017.
- MHSA Innovation (10/26/17)
  - ✓ The following proposals were presented to the MHSOAC and approved for implementation (10 million dollars) on October 26, 2017:
    - o INN 16 Urban Beats (expansion-two additional years)
    - o INN 17 Crest Mobile Hoarding (expansion-18 additional months)
    - o INN 19-Telemental: The 5.2 million dollars project proposes to facilitate connections to outpatient services and reduce potential recidivism for unconnected clients experiencing psychiatric crisis and/or hospitalization by increasing access to effective follow-up therapeutic services through the use of technology. This project will serve youth and adults who are unconnected to outpatient services, who have experienced a psychiatric emergency, and are at risk of recidivism. A competitive procurement process will be initiated and program implementation is expected in Fiscal Year 2019-20.
  - Council discussion and inquiry led to review the Medication Clinic Innovation Project (Yael Koenig): The Medication Clinic Innovation plan was approved by the MHSOAC on May 25, 2017. The plan proposes a countywide Psychotropic Medication Clinic(s) that would offer children continued medication and Tele-Psychiatric support after completing their primary outpatient treatment. This program will also benefit those children with severe developmental needs. Program implementation is expected in Fiscal Year 2018-19 and will be known as the Center for Child and Youth Psychiatry. The Request for Proposal was posted on November 8, 2017. A Pre-Proposal Conference will be held on November 17, 2017 from 10:00 am-12:00 pm in the offices of the County of San Diego, Department of Purchasing and Contracting, 5560 Overland Avenue, Suite 270, San Diego, CA 92123. #### V. "Hot Topics" Discussion (Yael Koenig)

#### Public Input/Discussion Summary

- 10 Year Roadmap (Handout) Dialogue Summary
  - The BHS Roadmap document was first launch in July 2016 and it is currently under revision. It includes 12 priorities, each with two to three strategies with audacious goals. It also includes Vision Statements.
  - ✓ Feedback to the CYF Vision Statement:
    - **Current:** "Children and Youth are healthy, safe, successful in school and in their transition to adulthood; law abiding, while living in a community that supports strong family connections".





Proposed (with Behavioral Health Advisory Board input): "Children and Youth are healthy, safe, sheltered, successful in school and in their transition to adulthood, while being law abiding, and living in a community that supports strong family connections".

Summary of the feedback to the CYF vision language includes:

- "Children and youth are living in healthy, safe, stable and nurturing environments, including their homes, schools, and communities, allowing them to be lawful and successful as they transition into adulthood and create community that supports strong family and responsible citizens".
- o Consider alternative language to "sheltered", like "permanency", "living in a safe home", "stable home environment".
- Evaluate the use of "law abiding"
- Consider adding "importance of moral guidance at home" or "prosocial"
- o Consider including "natural supports"
- Need to consider the audience

Summary of the feedback to the Roadmap includes:

o It needs to be consistent with the CYF System of Care (SOC) principles

#### ✓ BHETA Training- Rose Woods

o BHETA provides training to BHS through the Academy for Professional Excellence. There are five specific CSOC trainings offered per fiscal year. It also provides Pathways to Well-Being and Treatment and Evaluation Resource Management (TERM) trainings. BHETA soon will offer Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) training and resources that will be located in the main BHETA website for additional support in the implementation of new State mandated outcome measures. Additionally, an annual conference is coordinated with the CSOC Training Academy. The Academy is currently seeking representatives from the Education Sector and CWS. The CSOC Academy meets on the first Wednesday of the month from 9:00 to 10:00 A.M. at 6505 Alvarado Road, Suite 107, San Diego, CA 92120. #### ✓ Education- Violeta Mora on behalf of Heather Nemour

- o The Education Sub-Committee works towards enhancing relationships with behavioral health and education providers. In Fiscal Year 2016-17, the SDCOE renewed the Global Oversight Analysis Linking Systems (GOALS) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and it is effective through October 31, 2019. Additionally, the SDCOE provided trainings including but not limited to: Youth Mental Health First Aid, 2017 Inclusion Through Kindness and Compassion Summit, Standards of Quality for Family Strengthening and Support, CSEC Awareness and Prevention Curriculum training for Elementary, Middle and High School youth, Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network (GLSEN), Question, Persuade and Refer (QPR) Gatekeeper, and Trauma Informed Care trainings. Most of these trainings were completed in collaboration with other partners like HHSA, private sector, and other Education partners.

#### **Purpose**

The ultimate goal of Family and Youth as Partners (FYP) Subcommittee is to bring the Children, Youth and Family Behavioral Health System of Care Council (CYFBHSOCC) information and feedback from the FAMILY SECTOR and the FAMILY/YOUTH PARTNER Community.

#### The purpose of the FYP Subcommittee is:

- To strengthen a system-wide shared identity of Family/Youth Partners.
- To share resources and information on opportunities to strengthen and grow Family/Youth Partners.
- To strengthen the Four Sectors [Family, Public, Private, and Education] understanding and recognition of Family/Youth Partners.

#### Family and Youth as Partners-Sub-Committee FY 16-17 Accomplishments

Coordinated the 3rd Annual Children's Mental Health Well-Being Celebration: "Growth, Health,
Hope," on May 3, 2017 held at the Spring Valley East Community Center. There were 171 attendees
[140-CSOC family members, 30-families, 48-adults, 86-children, 6-TAY youth, 31-Providers].
 Families created a five panel community art project which was displayed at County Administration
Building (see photo inset.)



- Introduced the "FYP Digital Portrait" to the Children's System of Care (CSOC) as a digital tool that provides a visual narrative introducing the concept of "lived experience" and "Family/Youth Partner" along with providing an individual personal narrative. This tool, developed by the CYF Liaison, helps Family/Youth Partners engage quickly, authentically and deeply with the families they serve. This is also an excellent tool to demonstrate to providers and clinicians how effective professionally sharing lived experience can be.
- Encouraged CSOC Training of 68 Family/Youth Partners and 61 Providers/Program Staff participating in CYF Liaison trainings;
  - ✓ "Working Together," 4-hour/4 CEH, in-person training for Family/Youth Partners and
    Providers/Program Staff and,
  - ✓ "Principals of Family Youth Professional Partnerships", 1-hour/1 CEH training on collaboration





and support between CSOC professional staff and staff with lived experience.

Encouraged monthly Family Youth/Partner Coaching participation by CSOC Family/Youth Partners, facilitated by the CYF Liaison. In FY16-17, 57 CYF Peer Staff attended this meeting.

#### Family and Youth as Partners-Sub-Committee Proposed Goals for Fiscal Year 2017-18

Coordinate the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Children's Mental Health Well-Being Celebration (May 2018) with Family, Public, Private and Education Sector representatives on the planning committee. Expand outreach and promotion of event to include digital platforms in addition to making sure event is represented throughout BHS & HHSA calendar network.

- The CSOC currently has more than 25 titles for CYF staff with lived experience which contributes to a lack of shared identity among system staff. To strengthen a system-wide shared identity, the FYP Subcommittee would like to introduce the benefits of having one unifying "NAME" for CYF Peer Staff with lived experience; Family/Youth Partner. We will create a plan to introduce this concept to the CSOC through the CYFBHSOCC. Encourage CSOC Providers to send their peer staff with lived experience to the monthly FYP Coaching meetings as support and professional development for CSOC Family/Youth Partners
- Encourage CSOC Providers and Family/Youth Partners to participate in CYF Liaison CSOC trainings that strengthen collaboration and support between professional staff and staff with lived experience.
- Achieve Four Sector (Family, Public, Private, and Education) representation on this subcommittee.

- Create healthy communities using evidence-based practices
- Provide a vital link between systems, consumers, and families.

#### FY 16-17 Accomplishments

- Appointment of co-chairs from both Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders (SUD) providers representatives
- Increased participation of SUD providers

#### **Proposed Goals for Fiscal Year 2017-18**

- Explore ways to facilitate warm handoffs and enhance care coordination between SUD and Mental Health programs:
  - Develop guidelines for collaborating when multiple programs are co-located on school sites (i.e. EPSDT and Teen Recovery Centers (TRC) services)
  - Ensure collaboration is part of discharge planning
  - o Continue to build relationships and connections between providers
    - Schedule tours of each other's program
    - Develop a contact card for program-to-program communication
  - Continue to strive for cross-sector representation at meetings from all sides of the system
- Provide ongoing in-service presentations to learn more about referring into different systems

To identify Experimenting: "Have you ever experimented (only 1-3 times) with any substances?" To identify At Risk: "Client has a parent or caregiver with a substance abuse problem?" Committee considering review of the completion rate and number endorsed for each of the new questions, CFARS, CRAFFT, and Diagnosis data.
- Aligning the Wraparound Principles with the SOC principles. Review the language for the Persistence Principle as a suggested 10<sup>th</sup> System of Care Principle.
- Provide recommendations on methods of assessing the level of SOC Principles applied in programs such as program self-assessment check list, Success Stories/Good News Highlights, incorporate with Site Visit, etc.
- Generate Future Performance Improvement Project (PIP) ideas for spring of 2018.

#### Update

- SDCOE has conducted 38 YMHFA trainings and certified approximately 1,100 school staff to date.
- SDCOE has coordinated 4 Nami on Campus trainings that included 25 schools and 172 high school students to date.
- SDCOE offered 68 trainings with over 2,000 participants on a variety of prevention topics
- SDCOE is collaborating with the Suicide Prevention Council (SPC) on promoting a common suicide threat assessment tool that is evidence based (Columbia Severity Rating Scale) to be used across all 42 school districts, law enforcement and health care.

#### Update: FY16/17 Goals/Focus Areas

- SDCOE will ensure that all 42 school districts in San Diego County adopt a comprehensive Suicide
  Policy that will include prevention, intervention, and postvention protocols. To date, SDCOE
  trained 20 school districts on this topic and will continue to provide guidance, consultation, and
  technical assistance to all 42 school districts.
- SDCOE will partner with the County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency, LIVE WELL
  San Diego on SDCOE's Annual Summit on Student Engagement and Attendance. Understanding
  the value and power of relationships is essential in the work with youth. Connections made in and
  out of the classroom are directly tied to attendance. Attendees will learn about best practices,
  latest trends, and strategies for building and maintaining engagement with youth and families.
- SDCOE will continue to offer trainings in Youth Mental Health First Aid in an effort to train K-12 educators and school personnel among the 42 school districts and surrounding charter schools.
- SDCOE will continue to collaborate with CHIP to co-host QPR: "Question, Persuade, and Refer" Gatekeeper Trainings in an effort to train K-12 educators and school personnel among the 42 school districts.


