 - B. Fiscal Year (FY) 16-17 CAO Recommended Operational Plan
 - On May 5, 2016/, HHSA Finance Director, Andy Pease presented the HHSA Recommended Fiscal Year 16-17 Operational Plan to the Behavioral Health Advisory Board (BHAB). The Chief Administration Office recommends \$44.7 M in Expanded Behavioral Health Services programs. This presentation will be forwarded to the CYF Council electronic distribution list.
 - C. Substance Use Disorder- Drug Medi-Cal (DMC)
 - A Board Memo with the DMC Implementation Plan is tentatively scheduled for September,
 2016
 - Drug Medi-Cal rates need to be adjusted. BHS will meet with Alcohol and Drug Service Provider Association (ADSPA) to discuss Drug Medical rates. Proposed rates will be included in the plan and must be approved by the State.
 - The American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria Implementation Plan will be also be included in the DMC Implementation Plan.





IV. Mental Health Services Act (MHSA)- Update (Adrienne Yancey)

A. Annual MHSA Plan

- The current three-year San Diego County MHSA Program and Expenditure Plan includes FY 2014-15 through FY 2016-17. The required annual update for fiscal year 2016-17 was released on May 2, 1016 for a 30-day public review that ends June 2, 2016. A public hearing will be held at the Behavioral Health Advisory Board meeting located at 1600 Pacific Highway, San Diego, CA, 92101, Room 302, on Thursday, June 2, 2016, at 3:30 P.M.
- The MHSA Fiscal Year 2016-17 Annual Update highlights existing and/or proposed programs for Community Services and Supports, Prevention and Early Intervention, Workforce Education and Training, Innovation, and Capital Facilities/Technological Needs totaling \$182 Million. This is an increase of \$54 Million from the original proposed MHSA Three Year Program and Expenditure Plan.

Private Sector CSOC Council Subcommittee Recommendations May 2016

Thank you to the Children, Youth and Families System of Care Council Private Sector Work Group / Subcommittee for attending to critical system needs and identifying a set of recommendations for ongoing system improvement. The Private Sector's leadership in the area of integrated and coordinated care is evident and has been a long standing value of the System of Care as a whole. Below please find the eight recommendations that the Private Sector Work Group / Subcommittee outlined in May of 2016 with further discussion and input from CYF Administration.

- 1. Review the report from CASRC regarding the 13-session model. (Although reports from CASRC and CYF Administration indicated some level of success with the 13-session model, there are still expressed concerns about recidivism after the 13 sessions). Private Sector Work Groups. The Children, Youth & Families (CYF) Behavioral Health Services (BHS) Short-term Treatment Model Evaluation was completed by the Council Outcome Subcommittee in 2015. The evaluation looked at FY0910, FY1011, FY1112 and FY1213 to identify trends. Overall the outcome markers suggested that post Short Term Treatment Model, youth are spending less time in services but their clinical outcomes on the CAMS measure are similar. Under the Short Term Treatment Model it is acceptable to have episodic services, with children and youth returning to services if they are experiencing a new stressor that meets service criteria, or are having an exasperation of symptoms that require reengagement in treatment.
- 2. Define, develop, and train providers in the following:
 - a. Consistent application of terminology for what is considered an "urgent" referral
 (Possible Changes to the Coordination of Care form and Medical transition forms and
 - b. Incorporating the 'warm handoff' terminology in form and practice and call out the provider to provider with client/caregiver communication. *Behavioral Health Continuum of Care Council, County QI and Clinical Standards Groups.*

The Private Sector Work Group / Subcommittee has made considerable headway in this area and has created a 'warm handoff' informational tool as well as engaged the Health San Diego Quality Improvement Subcommittee – Behavioral health Work Group in updating the system wide Healthy San Diego Medi-Cal Behavioral Health Transition of Care Form. CYF Administration strongly supports these efforts and will continue to work with the Private Sector Work Group / Subcommittee to finalize the communication tools and facilitate a training / information platform to promote awareness.

3. Continue to enhance the use of Peers in each program. CYFSOC Family and Peer Work Group

The Children's System of Care has strong roots in valuing and promoting the contribution and role of Family and Youth Partners. Through the County, standards of practice and operational



guidelines are offered to promote the utilization and success of Partners in the System of Care. Trainings are designed and provided to advance the field in promoting numerous aspects of Family and Youth Partners. Designated positions within the system are exclusively designed for Partners with the necessary life experience. The CYF Council newly formed Family and Youth As Partners Subcommittee has begun working on how to further advance the field and promote utilization of Partners.

4. Analyze other opportunities to bill for activity (Brief Safety Contact Code, Billing for talking to Psychiatrist on the team, Pathways service codes, and codes for billing warm handoff activity (two programs open at once). County-Led Productivity Workgroup.

During the 15/16 fiscal year a County led Productivity Workgroup met to address challenges associated with Medi-Cal requirements with a final summary of recommendations and actions. Children providers also explored a Brief Safety Contract Code which presented numerous challenges. In February 2016 the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) issued Information Notice NO.: 16-004 regarding the Provision of Intensive Care Coordination (ICC) and Intensive Home Bases Services (IHBS) as Medically Necessary Through EPSDT. The intent is to implement this expansion effective 7-1-16 with trainings scheduled in June. Through the ICC and IHBS expansion there is an opportunity to provide intensive services as well as claim for time at a Child and Family Team meeting.

- 5. Analyze the impacts that the minimum wage hikes will have on the System of Care and determine if a change in the County Maximum Allowance (CMA), Cost per Client, productivity and E & E formulas could produce serving the same number of clients but allow for the provider to reinvest into staff costs. CYFSOC, County-Led Productivity Workgroup, and County Fiscal Work Group.
 - a. Determine feasibility of building economic increases into reprocured RFPs and new procurements that will be in line with the rising costs over the life of the contracts. CYFSOC and SDBHS.

The Mental Health Contractors Association and Alcohol and Drug Service Providers Association each meet monthly with the Behavioral Health Services Executive Team where these specific matters are discussed.

6. Respond to the feedback from the MHSA Community Forums regarding staff recruitment and retention by forming a special committee to specifically address these concerns. CYFSOC and SDBHS.

Having a strong and stable workforce is critical to offering high quality services to the public. The MHSA recognizes this through a dedicated Workforce Education and Training (WET) component which has benefited our system. At the Annual CYF SOC Strategic Planning set to occur in July, a recommendation can be made to develop a Council Subcommittee to address staff recruitment and retention, the discussions can also occur through the Private Sector Subcommittee or in an ad hock subcommittee.



- 7. BHS and the System of Care creating a task force to address the shortage of Psychiatrist/ prescribing physicians, etc... for Children's, Adults, and Older Adults as well as medication management in order to determine the appropriate resources in creating a plan to resolve to failure point. Clinical Standards SDBHS and County QI, Behavioral Health Continuum of Care, Health and Housing, and CYFSOC.
 - a. Analyze increase payment to Psychiatrists to retain and recruit into the system of care. Clinical Standards and Fiscal Work Groups.
 - b. Analyze if incentives, training and consultation to PCPs would ease their concern and increase interest in providing Med Management services. County QI, Behavioral Health Continuum of Care Council, and Clinical Standards.

The impact of limited psychiatry availability has been felt throughout the system and has implications for those we serve. In June the CYF Council will begin a Hot Topic discussion on this matter to further advance this dialog which will serve to guide next steps.

- 8. Create a subcommittee of CYFSOC to address information sharing
 - a. Analyze how the GOALS Information Sharing MOU can be part of the systems standard practices. *CFYSOC*.
 - b. Develop trainings on how to properly share information as opposed to focusing only on what not to do. *County QI and CYFSOC*.

Care coordination and information sharing facilitates high quality and integrated care. GOALS Information Sharing MOU is an example of a vehicle that promotes collaboration when entities elect to participate. Formations of Subcommittees to the CYF Council are traditionally discussed at the annual strategic planning meeting, but can be facilitated through the monthly Council meetings.



DOCUMENTATION TRAINING FOR CHILD/YOUTH, PARENT & PEER SUPPORT PARTNERS

This training is specifically designed for Child/Youth, Parent & Peer Partners who bill Medi-Cal. This training will cover how to choose the correct service code for the service provided and how to document medical necessity. This training will cover how to record non-billable services for those direct client services that may not be claimed to Medi-Cal. Other documentation standards and actual examples will be included as well.

This year's celebration included an art project based on the celebration theme:


Health Hope Happiness

Outcomes Committee Report to CYFBHSOC June 13, 2016

State POS (Performance Outcomes System):

The Outcomes Committee continues to check in on the activities and discussions from the State and Stakeholders with the Performance Outcomes System. Currently one of the focuses is on the Child Welfare System looking out Outcome Measures such as CANS (Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths) and TOPS (Treatment Outcome Package). CWS currently uses the Strengths Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ) as a screening tool. No decision has been made yet.

Trauma Rate in our Children's System of Care:

Review of trauma rate by looking at the assessment question of "Client Experienced Trauma" in Fiscal Year 1415. Tentatively 60.4% have been identified as experiencing trauma and 31.4% have not, totaling to 91.8% of the unduplicated clients served. Overall, in the Organizational Provider system, data shows good completion rate for this question. See attached provisional report. CASRC is doing a literature review to identify the prevalence rate in the general population and other public serving systems. Outcomes Committee is also taking action to help add Help Text to the BHA by using the SAMHSA definition.
