III. Public Input	No public input.	
IV. Director's Update (Alfredo Aguirre)	 National Update: Alfredo attended the NACO legislative conference that was held in Washington D.C. The conference brings county officials together and interact with federal officials to address and discuss federal policy issues that impact counties. 	
	 The following were a few topics that were addressed: Medicaid Bump Act – This bill amends title XIX (Medicaid) of the Social Security Act to increase the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage with respect to increased state Medicaid program expenditures for mental and behavioral health services. The Behavioral Health Coverage Transparency – This bill will hold health insurers accountable for providing adequate mental health benefits and increase transparency for consumers seeking coverage for mental illness and substance use disorders. 	
	 Medicare for All Act – This bill would establish a universal single-payer health program to ensure care for all residents of the United States. Veterans Treatment Court Improvement Act – This bill would require the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to hire 50 specialists for the Veterans Justice Outreach (VJO) Program. Keeping Communities Safe through Treatment Act - This bill directs the Department of Justice to establish a pilot program to provide grants to law enforcement agencies in designated high 	





	intensity drug trafficking areas for pre-booking diversion programs to divert low-level drug offenders to drug treatment programs. Local: The County continues seeking implementation of the DMC-ODS by the State. The objective of the DMC-ODS are: Increase the County of San Diego SUD provider network capacity & offered new services to number of Medi-Cal beneficiaries. Increase local oversight of the SUD provider network with the goals of improved service quality & cost efficiencies. Ensure efficient care coordination & linkages among physical health, mental health, & SUD services. Increase public safety through the implementation of evidence-based treatment services.	
V. Justice Involved Presentation (David Mullen)	 David presented, and overview of the Justice involved services: The development of the Justice-Involved service was so that persons with SMI or substance use disorders who are justice-involved have access to integrated treatment & supportive services by: Increasing access & connectivity between the justice system & Behavioral Health ensuring clients receive the appropriate level of care Deliver best practice services to improve wellness & reduce recidivism to justice-involved individuals, including those transitioning from custody to the community Evaluating impact through data & definitions to improve outcomes & support recovery Presentation handout available upon request. 	
VI. MHSA Update (Adrienne Yancey)	 The California State Auditor conducted an audit to examined how DHCS & the MHSOAC accounted for & spent the funding, as well as the effectiveness of overseeing the MHSA. The state selected three local mental health agencies (Alameda, Riverside, and San Diego counties), and determined that they allocate the MHSA funding appropriately and generally monitored their MHSA-funded projects effectively. The audit found that DHCS has not provided effective direction to local mental health agencies on how to spend MHSA funds, which has impacted the ability of local mental health agencies to use 	





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	MHSA funds. Additionally, the audit reports that DHCS inadequately oversees the MHSA funds received by local mental health agencies.
	The audit also reports that the MHSOAC needs to work on developing a guidance for the Innovation program approval process.
	The California State Auditors will be working with the Departments to resolve these issues.
