V.	VA Mental Health Services for Older Adults (Tina Mays, VA)	Tina Mays, Psychologist and Dr. Catherine Ayers gave an overview of the services provided at through the VA's Geropsychiatry Clinic. Other information included a profile of the older adult veteran's population in San Diego, the mental health issues they are dealing with resulting from trauma and aging and the services provided to that population by the Veteran's Administration.

	housing related support to seniors; and O Proposed 2 billion dollar "No Place Like Home" bond on the November ballot to provide affordable housing units to people with serious mental illness. Alfredo also gave an overview of the upcoming June Board letter that has additional funds for housing.	
II. Older Adult SOC Update (Piedad Garcia)	 Piedad provided updates on the following: The Alzheimer's Response Team (ART) kick-off will be on June 4th. PERT will be supportive of this endeavor for 51/50 or other safety issues. The ART team is doing presentation to agency partners about their role and to inform partners of what resources are available. The DMC Organized Delivery system that was approved by the Board of Supervisors in March 2018 to expand the Substance Use Disorder (SUD) delivery system; will be in effect July 1, 2018. Piedad gave an overview of the new SUD system under DMC and some of the challenges providers and the County are facing. AOA is prepared as possible by having contracts in place and providing technical assistance to SUD contractors. Expansion and extension of the CREST program to go Countywide is now back on track after several delays and will be up and running on July 1st. Piedad suggested to the council they might want to include 	
	Senior Impact, Agewise, and the Geriatric Senior Outreach component imbedded in AOA programs on their speaker's calendar in order to access information on program data, outcomes, and activities.	
III. MHSA Update (Adrienne Yancey)	Martin Dare reported that general community engagement process that goes on in August for MHSA will now have a separate process for Innovation projects and that a consultant has been selected and will be on board by July 1 st .	
IV. QI Update (Dasha Dahdouh)	Dasha Dahdouh reported that the CCRT team is working on the Cultural Competence Plan that will be submitted to that state by June 30 th . The state survey wrapped up last week and the results will be available in 6 months.	
	Dasha announced that she will be leaving the Older Adult Council. Dasha is a Rady's Childrens employee who was contracted to work with the County and is now returning to Rady's Children's proper to support the Autism Clinic with the Mental Health aspect of that program. Dasha introduced her replacement, Eric Camerino, who will be the new QI representative.	





V.	Housing Council (Ruth Covell)	Ruth Covell, reported that she did not attend the Housing Council meeting, but restated her concerns about the loss of affordable housing in San Diego. A general discussion followed, with members siting several examples of the loss of additional housing throughout San Diego County.
