## WIC Code Duties

1. Review any county agreements entered into pursuant to Section 5650. The local behavioral health board may make recommendations to the governing body regarding concerns identified within these agreements.
2. Advise the governing body and the local behavioral health director as to any aspect of the local behavioral health program.
3. Review and evaluate the community's public behavioral health needs, services, facilities, and special problems in any facility within the county or jurisdiction where mental health or substance use disorder evaluations or services are being provided, including, but not limited to, schools, emergency departments, and psychiatric facilities.
4. The board shall assess the impact of the realignment of services from the state to the county, on services delivered to clients and on the local community.
5. Submit an annual report to the governing body on the needs and performance of the county's behavioral health system.
6. Review and comment on the county's performance outcome data and communicate its findings to the California Behavioral Health Planning Council.
7. Review and approve the procedures used to ensure citizen and professional involvement at all stages of the planning process.
8. Review and make recommendations on applicants for the appointment of a local director of behavioral health services. The board shall be included in the selection process prior to the vote of the governing body.
