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Mobile Crisis Response Team





OVERVIEW & SERVICE MODEL

- Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) is a non-law enforcement, clinical response to behavioral health crises
- Teams include one licensed clinician, one peer support specialist, and one case manager
- Teams provide assessments, deescalation, write 5150/5585 petitions and transport
- Connection to crisis stabilization units and behavioral health services

Overview and Implementation





Eligibility

MCRT referrals must meet the safety criteria below:

No injuries requiring a medical response.

No weapons involved or known to be in possession of person.

The person is not involved in serious criminal activity, related to this call, that warrants law enforcement.

Person is not known to be wanted in connection with an ongoing law enforcement investigation.

No threat of immediate violence or reasonable potential for immediate violence or use of violence toward others or self.

Law enforcement was not specifically requested.

MCRT Outcomes





- As of June 2025, MCRT has responded to over 25,000 calls, since the 2021 inception of services
- MCRT's goal is to provide response in under one hour
 - In Fiscal Year 24-25, 98% of calls met this goal
 - Current average response time is 24 minutes, countywide

• In FY 24/25:


- MCRT responded to over 10,464 calls
 - Over 49% resulted in stabilization in the field (no transport needed)
 - Approximately 21% resulted in transport to lower level of care (such as a CSU)
 - Approximately 12% resulted in transport to higher level of care (such as Emergency Department)
 - Less than 2% of interventions resulted in police intervention
 - Approximately 15% have resulted in petitions for psychiatric holds (5150/5585)

MCRT School Campus Response





- May 2023 School District Steering Committee
- September 2024 Fallbrook Pilot
- Since October 2024 Hosted monthly webinars for School Personnel
- November 2024 All District Roll out
- March/April 2025 SDCOE provided School Best Practices training for all MCRT staff
- As of June 2025 MCRT has responded to 229 referrals on school campuses since September 2024



How Schools Access MCRT?





 Schools can access MCRT by calling a dedicated dispatch line for schools. Teams are trained to assess, de-escalate the behavioral health crises and coordinate care with the guardian and school personnel

When to Call MCRT





Safety Criteria:

- ✓ No weapons
- ✓ No threat of immediate violence to self or others
- ✓ No physical injuries /medical emergency

Other Criteria:

- ✓ The student is not involved in serious criminal activity
- ✓ The student is not known to be wanted in connection with an ongoing criminal investigation
- ✓ Law enforcement was not specifically requested

Consider MCRT when student has:


- Active Suicide Ideation
- Extreme Paranoia
- Dissociation
- Active Visual or Auditory Hallucinations

Psychiatric Emergency Response Team (PERT)





- PERT consists of a licensed mental health professional paired with a specially trained law enforcement officer.
 PERT assists individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis, who contact 9-1-1 or their local law enforcement nonemergency number
- PERT is funded for 70 teams and partners with 11 municipal law enforcement agencies throughout the County of San Diego.
- PERT assists individuals of all ages who are voluntary or meet WIC 5150 criteria and will transport to the appropriate level of care as necessary as well as provide care coordination, resources and offer follow up via Peer Support services. PERT will coordinate with MCRT as appropriate.
- FY 24-25, PERT provided 8,900 behavioral health interventions.



Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) Overview





PURPOSE

Crisis Stabilization Units provides immediate urgent behavioral health treatment services to individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis.

OVERVIEW OF SERVICES

Services provided on a short-term basis (up to 24 hours/7 days per week):

- Individualized care provided in a calming environment to support mental wellness and recovery.
- Resources and connections to ongoing behavioral health services
- County of San Diego funded CSUs serve all individuals including those who are Medi-Cal eligible or uninsured.

• Currently, there are 6 County-funded CSUs, with an additional 2 location expected to open by early-2026


