
Child and Family Well Being Fiscal Year 2023/24 Statistics









38,754 abuse/neglect reports were made to the Hotline which represents 67,694 children.

(Children can be counted more than once if referred multiple times throughout the year)

18,980 of those reports, including 36,255 of those children were assigned for investigation.


> 243 New Voluntary Services cases were opened during the year.

Children Receiving Services as of July 1, 2024

- 2,182 children and youth in an open case:
 - •211 young adults in Supportive Transition
 - •419 children were receiving services in their home.
 - •1,552 children were in out-of-home care:
 - •39% Kinship Care
 - •52% Non-kinship care
 - •24% Resource Family Homes
 - •13% Guardian and Court Specified Homes
 - •7% Foster Family Agency Homes
 - •4% Group Home
 - •3% San Pasqual Academy
 - •1% Temporary Shelter Care Facility
 - •1% Adoptions pending/finalized
 - •8% Other (e.g. trial home visits with parents, non-foster care placements)

628 new petitions were filed on behalf of children.

5,726 children (3,129 families) referred with allegations of abuse or neglect.

4,672 children (2,499 families) referred with allegations of abuse or neglect.

6,317 children (3,325 families) referred with allegations of abuse or neglect.



East

7,869 children (4,060 families) referred with allegations of abuse or neglect.

On July 1, 2024:

253 children receiving services

- •79% were dependents¹
- •21% were in voluntary services
- •0% were pending

201 were in out-of-home care

- •36% kinship care
- •53% non-kinship care
- •10% other

South

6,820 children (3,524 families) referred with allegations of abuse or neglect.

On July 1, 2024:

228 children were receiving services

- •73% dependents¹
- •26% were in voluntary services
- •1% were pending

180 were in out-of-home care

- •36% kinship care
- •59% non-kinship care
- •6% other

¹ Children can be in three types of status: dependents, which are children receiving services ordered by the Juvenile Court; voluntary services; or pending.

² Specialized Programs consists of Residential Services, Adoptions, Child Abuse Hotline, Extended Foster Care, Indian Specialty Unit, San Pasqual Academy, Workforce Training, Voluntary Services, and Open Case Investigations.

³ The North Central Region includes the Medical/Deaf Services Unit

When a voluntary case is opened in North Coastal, the case is transferred to North Inland.
