## **HEPATITIS A VIRAL INFECTION**

Hepatitis A is a highly contagious, short-term liver infection caused by the hepatitis A virus.

## **HOW DOES IT SPREAD?**

Hepatitis A is found in the blood and stool of someone with hepatitis A. If someone with hepatitis A virus has not washed their hands after using the toilet, germs can spread on things they touch.



Touching objects or eating food handled by someone with hepatitis A.



Close personal contact with someone with hepatitis A. This includes having sex, taking care of, or sharing items (needles, pipes) to use drugs, or sharing utensils.

## SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Not everyone with hepatitis A has symptoms. If symptoms develop, they usually appear 2-7 weeks after infection. Symptoms include:

- Jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes)
- · Loss of appetite (not wanting to eat)
- Upset stomach/stomach pain
- Throwing up
- Dark urine or light-colored stools
- Diarrhea
- Joint pain
- Feeling tired



## **PREVENTION**



Vaccination is the best way to prevent Hepatitis A.

Getting 2 shots 6 months apart provides the best protection. You can still get vaccinated even after being exposed to the virus.



Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds after using the bathroom, changing diapers, and before preparing or eating food.
