Blueprint for a Safer Economy

NEW! Governor Gavin Newsom unveiled the Blueprint for a Safer Economy, a statewide, stringent and slow plan for living with COVID-19 for the long haul. The plan imposes risk-based criteria on tightening and loosening COVID-19 allowable activities and expands the length of time between changes to assess how any movement affects the trajectory of the disease.

NEW! Letter to All Facilities: AFL 20-46.2 – August 31, 2020

Requests for Urgent Staffing Resources for COVID-19 (This supersedes AFL 20-46.1) This AFL clarifies the process for requesting staffing resources for healthcare facilities and alternate care sites during COVID-19; provides a quick reference resource on multi-jurisdictional responses to emergencies and disasters in California; and provides clarification regarding the costs facilities may incur when accessing staffing resources.

Letter to Long-Term Care Facilities: AFL 20-22.4 – August 25, 2020

Guidance for Limiting the Transmission of COVID-19 in Long-Term Care Facilities (This supersedes AFL 20-22.3)

- This AFL notifies long-term care facilities of CMS and CDC guidance for improving their infection control and prevention practices to prevent the transmission of COVID-19, including revised guidance for visitation,
- authorizes LTC facilities to temporarily modify their facility's visitation policies in accordance with CMS and CDC COVID-19 guidance when necessary to protect the health and safety of residents, staff, and the public, and
- updates visitation guidance to require facilities to permit ombudsman to enter regardless
 of whether or not there is a COVID-19 outbreak.

FDA testing uncovered toxic ingredients in some hand sanitizers – find out if your product on the list. NEW! President Trump Is Taking Strong Action to Further Protect Nursing Homes from the Coronavirus.

President Trump is now requiring all nursing homes to test their staff on a regular basis. Testing will occur twice a week, weekly, or monthly, depending on local factors such as an individual facility's risk for COVID-19 transmission. 

Latest San Diego County Public Health Order

The latest updates to the local Public Health Order included additional key items for reopening businesses (September 1, 2020).

The state introduced a new tiered system on August 28, 2020, that allows certain indoor activities to resume in San Diego County. However, businesses must adhere to industry-specific guidelines and follow hygiene, social distancing and face covering requirements. While many sectors can reopen, not all can operate at full capacity. Gyms and fitness centers can operate indoors but must limit attendance to 10% capacity or less.

Restaurants can open indoor dining but must limit indoor operations to 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is lower. Places of worship and movie theaters can operate indoors under those same capacity limits. Museums can open at 25% capacity. Read the latest order.

Developmental Disabilities

Developmental Disability Definition

Developmental disability means:

- a condition that originates before an individual attains age 18 years,
- continues or can be expected to continue, indefinitely, and
- constitutes a substantial disability for that individual.

Developmental Disability Definition

This term includes a diagnosis of:

- Intellectual Disability
- Cerebral Palsy
- Epilepsy
- Autism
- conditions found to be closely related to an Intellectual Disability or to require treatment similar to that required for individuals with an Intellectual Disability, but shall not include other handicapping conditions that are solely physical in nature.

Substantial Disability

A condition which results in a major impairment of cognitive and/or social functioning, representing sufficient impairment to require interdisciplinary planning and coordination of special or generic services to assist the individual in achieving maximum potential.



Substantial Disability

The existence of significant functional limitations in three or more of the following areas of major life activity:

- Self-care
- Communication
- Learning
- Mobility
- Self Direction
- Capacity for Independent Living
- Economic Self Sufficiency

UPDATE on Adult Day Services

Retainer payment ends 8/31/2020

Emergency regulation developed for Alternate Services Delivery for Non-residential services effective 9/1/2020:

- DDS provided authority to waive various statutory and regulatory requirement s during the State of Emergency.
- Allows flexibility for service providers to tailor services to meet people where they are.
- Builds on innovative service delivery approaches to support individuals while limiting potential exposure to COVID-19.

TYPES OF ALTERNATIVE SERVICE DELIVERY:

- -Supports related to minimizing the exposure to or impact of COVID-19
- -Completion of an individual assessment
- -Completion of an individualized service plan
- -Services delivered to the consumer via telephone, video or other electronic communication
- -Delivery of meaningful supplies or other items to the consumer's home
- -Use of self-guided training and educational materials supplied by the provider to support the service San Diego

Regional Center

TYPES OF ALTERNATIVE SERVICE DELIVERY CONT'D:

- -Skills training to individuals within the household to support the consumer
- -Service provided in-person, modified to comply with the most restrictive state or local guidelines in effect
- -Supports for transition to the Self-Determination Program
- -Training provided to vendor staff
- -Other alternative services

TIPS FOR HELPING PERSONS WITH IDD WITH COVID:

Tip 1: Use plain language and meaningful words when speaking with people with intellectual disabilities.
