

CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE




- √ Bicameral
 - Assembly: 80 members
 - Senate: 40 members
- ✓ Two-year session, with legislature in session year-round
- ✓ In second year of two-year session



U.S. CONGRESS

- √ Bicameral
 - Senate (100 members)
 - House of Representatives (435 members)
- ✓ Representatives serve two-year terms
- ✓ Senators serve a six-year term, with terms staggered; every two years approximately one-third of the Senate is up for election



2016 COUNTY SPONSORSHIP PROPOSALS

Emergency Medical Services Contracts

Seek a legislative solution to clarify Local Emergency Medical Services Agency ("LEMSA") authority to grant Exclusive Operating Areas (EOA) and LEMSA authority to authorize EOAs to conduct their own competitive procurements.

Integrated Agency

Recent changes in state statute added language regarding counties with integrated health and human services agencies. The County of San Diego seeks to be added to the list of recognized integrated agencies

Refugee Impact Grant Program (Board Directed)

Seek to establish a grant that would provide funding or appropriate funding from an existing federal discretionary grant to provide assistance to government agencies and community organizations in San Diego County heavily impacted by Iraqi refugees.

Refugee Services: Results Based Contracting (Board Directed)

Seek a change in federal procedure that would require the federal government to adopt outcome or results based contracting practices with the organizations they fund to provide refugee services.

TOBACCO CONTROL RESOURCE PROGRAM HISTORY



FUNDED BY PROPOSITION 99

• 11/08/1988: 25-cent tax on cigarettes



- The Tobacco Tax and Health Protection Act (Proposition 99) dedicated 5 cents of the 25-cent tax to fund
 California's tobacco control efforts
- At CTCP's inception, more than 1 in 5 adults in California smoked cigarettes; today, that number is less than 1 in 8

TOBACCO CONTROL RESOURCE PROGRAM



LOCAL PRIORITIES DIRECTED BY COUNTY BOS

- Guided by BOS Policy A-99: Tobacco and Electronic Smoking Device Use,
 Prevention and Cessation
- Purpose to establish policy guidelines for programs dealing with tobacco and electronic smoking device use, prevention and cessation
 - Includes guidance for work on local tobacco control efforts
- Main areas of focus
 - Reducing youth access to tobacco products
 - Reduce exposure to second-hand smoke

RECENT CA LEGISLATION



- Raises the age to 21 for purchase of tobacco products
- Includes e-cigs in current tobacco regulations
- Increases protection from second-hand smoke in additional workplaces
- All K-12 schools will be smoke-free
- Increases the licensing fees for distributing and selling tobacco products, starting in 2017



MAY 2016, REGULATIONS ON TOBACCO PRODUCTS

- Extending authority to cover all tobacco products,
 including vaporizers, vape pens, hookah pens, electronic
 cigarettes (E-Cigarettes), e-pipes, and all other ENDS
- Manufacturing standards
- 18 year old sales limit (will cover the 2 states that haven't acted yet), except where the age of sale is higher
- Will go into effect in 2 years
