21 LHJ's in California were invited to apply


CBOs and FQHCs within the LHJ's were also eligible to apply



DESIRED IMPACT

Linkage to Getting to Zero Implementation Plan

- Goal 1.1: Develop and implement campaign to promote awareness of pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) among high-risk populations
- Goal 2.3: Develop systems to ensure all individuals newly diagnosed with HIV are linked to care and commence treatment within 30 days
- Goal 3.1: Incorporate post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) and PrEP education into County HIV prevention and HIV testing programs



Linkage to Getting to Zero Implementation Plan

- Goal 3.5: Provide PrEP education to all HIVnegative individuals seeking services at the County's STD Clinics, and provide referrals to PrEP navigation assistance for individuals who are seeking PrEP
- Goal 3.6: Work with community partners to promote PEP and PrEP awareness and access
- Goal 5.2: Reduce stigma associated with HIV so that individuals at risk can seek testing and fully engage in treatment
