Background: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. The Title V Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Block Grant is federally administered by the Health Resources and Services Administration. b. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) receives Title V MCH Block Grant funding and distributes the allocations to local health jurisdictions in three-year funding cycles. c. Since 1998, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors has authorized agreements with the CDPH Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Division to accept a Title V MCH Block Grant Allocation. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) The Title V MCH Block Grant supports State-mandated Maternal, Child, and Family Health Services (MCFHS) programs designed to improve the health of mothers, children (including children with special healthcare needs), adolescents, and their families. 2) Additionally, since 2012, the Board has approved agreements with CDPH MCAH to accept grant funds for the effective coordination and delivery of the California Home Visiting Program (CHVP). 3) The CHVP is a home visiting program for families at risk for adverse childhood experiences, such as child maltreatment, domestic violence, mental illness, and substance abuse. 2. C. Approval of California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and (CDC) Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Grants for Countywide Tuberculosis Treatment and Control and Refugee Health Assessment Services and Authorize Participation in the San Diego County Tuberculosis Elimination Initiative (Districts: All), Board Letter, Susannah Graves, MD, MPH, Medical Director/Chief, Tuberculosis Control and Refugee Health Branch.

1. Background

- a. The County of San Diego provides Tuberculosis (TB) prevention and control services through a combination of federal, state and local funding sources.
- b. Since 1982, the CDC has awarded the County federal funds under a non-competitive Tuberculosis Control Cooperative Agreement (CoAG) to finance the costs of County personnel and other items that support TB surveillance and control.
 - 1) In addition, since 1999, the County of San Diego Board of Supervisors (BOS) has authorized grants with the CDPH, and the CDC for TB control and treatment as well as refugee health assessment services include TB testing and treatment.
- c. With the global resurgence of TB in the 1990s, public health agencies have focused on reducing and eliminating it as a public health threat.
- d. In 2014 the World Health Organization (WHO) launched a global strategy called *End TB* to achieve a goal of TB elimination (defined as less than one case per one million people) by the year 2035.
 - 1) The CDC Division of TB Elimination's Strategic Plan 2016-2020 outlines a national strategy for TB elimination. CDPH and the California TB Controller's Association have joined the effort.
 - 2) With global, federal, and state TB elimination efforts underway, combined with major advances in accurate testing and effective short-course treatment for latent TB infection (LTBI), the County of San Diego is poised to enhance efforts toward elimination.
- e. This action would formally establish the San Diego County TB Elimination Initiative, a coordinated effort to build an elimination framework that serves the County's diverse population and engage key stakeholders and communities impacted by TB.
- f. The goal of this initiative is to develop a plan and timeline to decrease the incidence of active TB cases in San Diego County by 98.6% to 1 case per million by 2040.

2. The following authorizations are being sought from the Board to execute documents related to the following grants:

- a. TB Control Cooperative Grant from CDC for the term January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020 for approximately \$1, 968, 511.
- b. TB treatment and control funding from CDPH for the term July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020, for approximately, \$954,189.
- c. Refugee Health Assessment Program (RHAP) Fee for Service Agreement and Refugee Health Prevention Program Agreement (RHPP) from CDPH for the term October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020, for approximately \$415,400.
- d. Participate in a one-year planning process with community partners to develop a roadmap for the County's TB Elimination Initiative.

3. This item supports the County's *Live Well San Diego* vision, by building a better service delivery system to reduce the spread of TB and improve health outcomes related to this disease in San Diego County, to promote a healthy, safe, and thriving region.

D. Approval of the HIV/AIDS Surveillance Revenue Agreement (Districts: All) Board Letter, Jeffrey M. Johnson, MPH< Chief, Samantha Tweeten, PhD, MPH, Epidemiologist, Epidemiology and Immunizations Services Branch. California

1. Background
 - a. This agreement provides services to reduce the transmission of HIV/AIDS in San Diego County and to improve health outcomes or people living with HIV/AIDS.
 - b. On July 1, 2013, the CDPH separated each of the AIDS Master Grant programs into individual agreements.
 - c. On August6, 2013 (06), the Board of Supervisors authorized a three- year agreement for HIV/AIDS Surveillance services, a program formerly included in the AIDS Master Grant, through June 30, 2019, for a cumulative total cost of \$2,075,031.
 - d. This action requests the Board to approve and to authorize the Clerk of the Board, upon receipt, to execute a new five-year HIV/AIDS Surveillance Agreement with CDPH, from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2024, for a projected five-year total cost of approximately \$4,500,000 and a projected five-year total revenue of \$3,500,000.
 - e. Authorization is further requested to apply for any additional funding that might be used to enhance surveillance to improve data-driven decision management in support of individuals and families in the County of San Diego who are impacted by HIV/AIDS.
2. The following authorization is being sought from the Board to execute documents related to the following grants:
 - a. Waive Board Policy B-29, Fee, Grants, Revenue Contracts – Department Responsibility for Cost Recovery, which requires prior approval of grant applications and full cost recovery of grants.
 - b. Approve and authorize the Clerk of the Board to execute a five-year agreement and all required grant documents with the California Department of Public Health for an HIV/AIDS Surveillance Grant Allocation to provide HIV/AIDS related surveillance for the period July 1, 2019 through June 20, 2024 for a five-year total of approximately \$4,500,000 or annual amount of approximately \$9000,000, including any extensions, amendments, or revisions that do not materially impact or alter the program or funding level.
 - c. Authorize the Health and Human Services Agency to apply for any additional funding opportunity announcements, if available, to enhance surveillance to improve data-driven decision management in support o those impacted HIV/AIDS.
3. This item supports the County's *Live Well San Diego* County of San Diego vision by supporting identification of reportable health conditions and access to high quality prevention, testing and medical care that leads to improved physical and behavioral health. Approval of this item will enable ongoing surveillance activities and information useful to improve the treatment and health of persons with HIV/AIDS in San Diego County.

<p>VII. Public Health Officer's Report</p>	<p>A. Communicable Disease Issues: Meningococcal Disease Outbreak 1.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. On 5/28/19, there have been no additional cases of meningococcal.2. The school year concluded with graduation ceremonies through May 19, 2019.3. The most recent vaccination outcomes for this outbreak are from May 9, 2019 and include: those who received any vaccination (either fully or partially vaccinated) in the student body which was 9,237, about 35% of the student population 23 years of age and younger.4. To date, 8,660 (37%) of the students 23 years of age and younger have been vaccinated.5. There are no planned vaccination events for the summer. However, SDSU will continue to offer the Men B vaccine through their student health services clinic.<ol style="list-style-type: none">a. In the fall, all new students will be required to vaccinated with both meningococcal vaccinations. Through President's Executive Order, in all 2020, the CSU system is recommending that students have both vaccinations.6. Measles:<ol style="list-style-type: none">a. There have been no cases of measles in San Diego during 2019.b. Weekly Situation Reports (SitReps) are being produced weekly, including cost analysis updates provided.<ol style="list-style-type: none">1) As of May 18, 2019, there has been 67 reported suspect cases of measles which required evaluation and investigation.2) None of these have been confirmed to be case of measles.3) Between January 1, 2019 and May 18, 2019, the cost for San Diego to respond to increased measles activity has been \$35,273. Of this, \$13,593 are costs due to increased lab testing of specimens for suspected cases.

7. Increase in Influenza-like Illnesses at Migrant Shelter:

- a. On May 24, 2019, a San Diego CAHAN was issued to inform the local medical community about an increase of influenza-like-illness (ILI) being seen at a local migrant shelter.
 - 1) The local migrant shelter has reported an increase in the number of ILIs seen in individuals arriving from Texas this week.
 - 2) Several local migrant shelter residents have been confirmed to have either pandemic A/H1 or seasonal A/He, both of which were matched to the 18/19 influenza vaccine.
 - 3) To date, there is no evidence of transmission occurring at the local migrant shelter, as individuals apparently have been exposed in Texas and then developed symptoms after arriving in San Diego.
 - 4) Likewise, there is currently no evidence of community-wide transmission of influenza associated with these cases.
 - 5) Since 5/19/2019 through 12:00AM on 5/29/2019, a total of 868 individuals have been assessed at the migrant shelter, with a total of 59 influenza-like illness cases detected.
 - 6) On 5/29/19, a total of 27 specimens were tested: Five were positive for influenza, three were Flu A H1 (pandemic), one was Flu A H3, and one was Flu B Yamagata. The first two were strains identified last week. The B Yamagata was previously identified in the shelter guests. All specimens (negatives and positives) are being sent to CDPH for further testing (viral respiratory panel or influenza subtyping, respectively).

B. Board Actions

- 1. Asylum Seeker Shelters: On January 29, 2019, the Board of Supervisors approved County property for temporary shelter use. The location is available only through December 31, 2019.
- 2. Tuberculosis (TB) Elimination Initiative: has a goal to decrease the incident of active TB cases and is docketed for the Board of Supervisor meeting for July of 2019.

C. Public Health Issues

- 1. Since the shelter opening in late October 2018, Public Health Services has received reports of 30 varicella cases in Asylum Seekers, 21 of which were in the shelter.
- 2. As of 5/29/2019, HHSA has conducted a total of 12, 321 health screening assessments.
- 3. As of 5/19/2019, San Diego County Public Health officials have been responding to an influenza outbreak among Asylum Seekers staying at the shelter.
 - a. To appropriately monitor the situation, additional reassessments of shelter guests are being completed to identify individuals who develop symptoms of influenza-like illness after the initial screening,
 - b. Ill families are isolated as appropriate to prevent further spread of the disease, and ensure individuals are healthy for travel before departure for their U.S. sponsor.

D. Grants

- 1. Kresge Emerging Leaders in Public Health Grant.
 - a. Dr. Wooten attended the third required in-person meeting on May 13-15, 2019.
 - b. The next training will take place on 6/5/19 (rescheduled from May 27 – Memorial Day).

E. Funding

- 1. Maternal Child and Family Health Services (MCFHS):
 - a. CDC-RFA-DP18-1813: REACH Grant: (\$900,000 per year for 5 years).
 - 1) Single source contract with University of California, San Diego Be There San Diego executed on April 1, 2019.
 - 2) Scope of Work for 2-1-1 San Diego submitted to Eligibility with anticipated start date of July 1, 2019.
- 2. CDC-RFA-DP18-1813: REACH Grant (\$792, 000 per year for 5 years).
 - a. Scope of Work for 2-1-1 San Diego submitted to Eligibility with anticipated start date of July 1, 2019.
 - b. Short-term Scope of Work for Circulate San Diego was sent to CDC for approval with anticipated start date of June 15, 2019.

- c. An RFQ was posted for medical services on May 23, 2019, with an anticipated effective date of June 24, 2019.
3. Gonorrhea Surveillance:
 - b. Update May 2019: CDPH submitted the application during the first week of May 2019.
2. Local Oral Health Program (LOHP):
 - a. The evaluation component is being developed by San Diego State University - Institute of Public Health contractor and will be submitted for approval in June 2019.
 - b. Oral Health Forum will be held on June 13m 2019 at Marina Village 8:30 am 0 3:30 pm (invitations will be going out soon).
 - c. Dr. Jayanth Kumar, Sate Dental Director, will also speak on the progress for the state.
 - d. Dr. Thomas Olinger will present a historical review of oral health in San Diego County, as well as look at present and ongoing programs.
 - e. Breakout Sessions will focus on, medical/dental integration, seniors, refugees, pregnant women and children ages 0-5, school aged children, and homelessness.
 - f. *Live Well* San Diego Oral Health Champion nominations were reviewed. Selected nominees will be awarded at the Oral Health Forum on June 13, 2019.
 - g. Aging and Independence Services Oral Health Collaboration – begun brief discussion of how Public Health Services and Medical Care Services Divisions can collaborate. Examples include a webinar to facilitate care. Plans to develop messaging specific to seniors for broad distribution, and oral health staff to present at the Vital Aging Event in June.
 - h. Public Health Center Collaboration. Beginning discussion on efforts to incorporate oral health instructions and the application of fluoride varnish in the Public Health Centers underway.
 - 1) County staff will be working in conjunction with the UCSD Dental Health Initiative Share the Care contractor to provide staff training to apply the varnish. In addition, assessing the feasibility to have a continuous loop oral health video playing in the waiting area as well as the application of fluoride varnish in conjunction with vaccination.
3. Strategic HIV Prevention Projects:
 - a. Funding ends 6/30/19.
 - b. CDPH has announced they will be releasing two new RFA's shortly.
 - c. One RFA will be demonstration project focusing on rapid linkage to antiretroviral therapy and the second is a continuation of demonstration project on pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) navigation.
 - d. Update May 2019: placements of PrEP component of the Getting to Zero campaign are being extended through the spring/early summer.
 - 1) New movie theatre placements are being p laced in four AMC theatres in San Diego (Mission Valley, Fashion Valley and Oceanside).
4. Tobacco Control Resource Program (TCRP):
 - a. Effective 5/27/19, Aaron De Leon will serve as Coalition and Community Engagement Lead for TCRP, fulfilling a CDPH-CTCP requirement for 1.0 FTE staff allocation to focus on adult engagement activities.
5. CalFresh Healthy Living (Formerly known as NEOP or Nutrition Education and Obesity Prevention, through the SNAP-ED Program).
6. Perinatal Equity Initiative:
 - a. A request for Supplemental Information (RSI) was sent in June 2019. It is expected that CDPH will issue funding for FY 19-20 for approximately \$488.047.
 - 1) Final funding amount will be decided with the release of the RSI.
 - b. Convened a Community Engagement Event on April 8, 2019 at the Jacobs Center Community Room.

- 1) Over 50 community partners participated in providing input on what are some factors that impact preterm births and what strategies/interventions should be implemented to improve the health of African American mothers and babies.
