

Activites included

- Regular telebriefings with key binational partners
- Sharing data & informational resources

- Establishing key connections
- Testing & vaccine strategies to support binational population

Due to these existing cross-border partnerships, when the COVID-19 pandemic began in early 2020, we immediately began communicating and strategizing on a binational response. In order to streamline activities, we set up a Binational sector to facilitate communication, response strategies, share data, and offer support to partners on both sides of the border.

The Binational sector began hosting biweekly calls on March 26, 2020 in partnership with ISESALUD, Health Services Jurisdiction of Tijuana, Tecate and Rosarito, Baja California and other key binational partners, primarily government agencies. Twenty-eight calls have taken place to date.

In addition to frequent calls, the binational sector responds daily to complex inquiries and requests and coordinates with partners to develop guidance and solutions. Examples include connecting physicians in Tijuana and San Diego to provide cross-border medical care, providing data reports to the Mexican Consulate in San Diego, and coordinating the delivery of cross border donations including personal protective equipment, supplies for migrant shelters, and COVID-19 tests.

Another component has been the development of strategies to improve testing and vaccine access to our binational community through setting up sites at convenient locations near the border crossing and working with the Mexican Consulate to create awareness and improve accessibility.


- This slide highlights some specific binational vaccine efforts.
- We have a great partnership with the Mexican Consulate here in San Diego and they have been an
 instrumental player in helping administer both COVID-19 testing and vaccines to our community. The
 Consulate is trusted by the community and individuals feel safe and welcome when they visit their location in
 Little Italy.
- In partnership with the Mexican Consulate, UCSD, the Secretary of Health in Baja California, Customs Border
 Protection and many binational business partners, we were able to implement a pilot border vaccine project.
 Over a couple weeks in June of this year, thousands of vaccines were provided to US-owned Tijuana
 Maquiladora employees at the San Ysidro Point of Entry. Over 10,000 individuals were vaccinated and it really
 is an outstanding example of the type of cross-border collaboration, coordination and strong partnerships that
 exist in our binational region.
- Also, I' d like to highlight another partnership with the California Department of Public Health and the US
 Consulate in Tijuana who were able to provide free COVID-19 vaccines to H-2A workers crossing into the U.S.
 from Tijuana, Mexico, at vaccination sites near the U.S.-Mexico border.
