Reproductive Health Care Assessment

Response to the Board of Supervisors Action on May 24, 2022: Strengthening Access to Reproductive Health Care





On May 24, 2022, Chair Nathan Fletcher and Vice-Chair Nora Vargas co-sponsored an agenda item to the San Diego County Board of Supervisors:

Strengthening Access to Reproductive Health Care: Conducting a Comprehensive Assessment of Reproductive Health Care Services in the County of San Diego and Advocating for State Legislation and Funding for Such Services and Rights.

At the time the Board approved this action, the Supreme Court of the United States of America (SCOTUS) had not yet delivered their decision on Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization. However, information had been made public indicating the likely outcome of the SCOTUS decision.

On June 24, 2022, exactly one month after the approval of the Board action, SCOTUS issued their ruling on this case, reversing the 1973 ruling on Roe v. Wade.

The Board directed the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to conduct a comprehensive assessment of reproductive health care services offered by County of San Diego (County), and County health contractors, including:

barriers to care

opportunities to optimize these services, including expanding partnerships with providers identify opportunities to address and reduce health disparities for marginalized communities

The Board Action also directed the CAO to advocate for regulatory, budgetary, and legislative efforts that strengthen access to reproductive rights and health care services, including abortion.

This report includes the assessment requested by the Board in 150 days or by October 25, 2022.

- The scope of this assessment focused on "prevention, identification (detection), and treatment of pregnancies that are unintended, undesired, non-viable and/or a threat to the pregnant person's health."
- Approach included:
 - Workgroup meetings and in-depth interviews with County department representatives to collect information on the aspects of reproductive health addressed in their programs
 - Literature review to identify best practices for increasing access to services
- Direct services for abortion are not provided by the County or contractors
- Staff are not trained to discuss pregnancy options
- Procedures or processes are not currently in place for assisting clients seeking abortion services
- Many programs provide sexual and reproductive health counseling
- Social services are available for clients seeking reproductive services
- Medication-induced abortion is available during early pregnancy
- Federal funding restrictions limit access to services for low-income and uninsured persons
- Limited data/information available for:
 - Abortion options and providers offering comprehensive reproductive health care services
 - Providers in the rural areas of the county
 - Number of persons seeking abortion services locally
 - Services that are culturally and linguistically responsive
- Misinformation on abortion risks and options
- Stigma from partner, family/friends, providers and society
- Active-duty military often face unique barriers to abortion access, including restrictive coverage, inability to arrange time off, concerns of privacy and fear of reprimand or career limitations

Questions/Comments:

Comment from Greg Knoll: This is one of the item that goes to the comment I hear all the time about, if you're going to be poor and in need of health care, California is the state to live in. They want to make healthcare accessible to everyone.



- There are well documented adverse health consequences of our carceral system including the impact that the social and environmental conditions have on one's physical and psychological well-being.
- Direct the Chief Administrative Officer to report back in 180 days with a proposed data management structure for efforts related to Recommendation 2 and report back in 90 days to provide a baseline status on the efforts related to Recommendation 2.

The Board directed the Chief Administrative Officer to:

- Develop a proposal and plan to advance:
 - Data Management/Governance
 - Integration
 - County Programmatic Data Sharing
 - Regional Community Information Exchange Utilization and Regional Health Information Exchange Utilization
- Return with a report on potential opportunities and challenges at the local, state and federal levels including, but not limited to, policy, funding, legal, compliance and regulation, and infrastructure.
- Pursue funding opportunities to support health care and social service data interoperability and integration efforts for justice-involved populations.

- The County's CalAIM Providing Access and Transforming Health Justice-Involved Capacity Building (PATH JI) Round 1 funding application was approved by the State Department of Health Care Services, and we intend to apply for the PATH JI Round 2 funding.
- Direct the Chief Administrative Officer to provide status updates on these Recommendations to the Board of Supervisors every 180 days.
- The Recommendations ask the County to take an initial step towards data integration and improved management to support justice-involved individuals who receive support and services, across and among:
- law enforcement
- correctional agencies
- community and health information exchanges
- health plans
- health and behavioral health providers
- social service providers
- health-care providers outside County payment or contract
- other entities as relevant
- The Board Action recognizes that there are opportunities and challenges at the local, state and federal levels related to policy, funding, legal, compliance and regulation, and infrastructure. To address them, we must first identify what they are.

Questions/Comments:

Question from Judith Yates: Will that board letter be circulated to the behavioral health advisory board?

Answer from Sayone Thihalolipavan: I will take that internally, not 100% sure.

Comment from Judith Yates: I recognize it is not a board letter, but I know there's a lot of interest.

Comment from Greg Knoll: - Run 180-day board memo / future updates by HSAB and BHAB *before* the BOS. There was not on the initial list with health advocates regarding our ability to try and get as many benefits started for people as they make the transition.

Comment from Sayone Thihalolipavan: Talking about racial equity and justice around, bringing them in and have them help us bring in community members into the space.

Comment from Caryn Sumek: at some point, EDs/hospitals need to be brought in because JI population overutilizes them

Comment from Greg Knoll: this is a community problem, where there is a boy in care, what usually happens is that hospital ends up taking over the incarceration. I agree with Caryn's request.

Comment from Ana Melgoza: share data w/FQHCs and healthcare system, need more than just a medical model approach and bring in providers who have experience working w/this population as part of the process.

The Public Health Laboratory (PHL) works in conjunction with public health clinics, local hospitals and healthcare providers, and the departments of Epidemiology and Environmental Health & Quality.

By analyzing clinical and environmental samples, the PHL participates in the core activities of surveillance, assessment and assurance.

Accepting the grant will strengthen Healthcare-Associated Infections (HAI)/Antimicrobial Resistance (AR) program capacity at the San Diego County Public Health Laboratory by funding:

- o A public health microbiologist
- o Laboratory equipment, reagents, and supplies
- Maintenance contracts with commercial entities that provide testing needs
- Population of San Diego County, with the opportunity to expand to other areas of our region within the Antimicrobial Resistance Laboratory Network (ARLN) if needed
- Patients in:
- Hospitals
- Skilled nursing facilities

- Long term acute care facilities
- Other healthcare settings
- Enhance detection for resistance tracking, identifying pathogen-specific solutions and creating public health strategies
- Develop better infection control guidelines to prevent and combat future AR threats
- Utilize the CDC AR Isolate Bank as a tool for improved diagnostics and novel therapeutic options.
- Work with state and regional labs to identify local transmission patterns and support outbreak response
 Recommendation:
 - Additional \$343,781
 - Funding period:

June 1, 2022, to July 31, 2024

 Approve and recommend the estimated \$343,781 from the California Department of Public Health, for the Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity Strengthening Healthcare-Associated Infections/Antimicrobial Resistance Program grant allocation for the period of June 1, 2022, to July 31, 2024.

- 1. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service has established the Local Food Purchase Assistance (LFPA). The LFPA program is part of the "Build Back Better" initiative, authorized by the American Rescue Plan. The purpose of this program is to maintain and improve food and agricultural supply chain resiliency.
- 2. The State recognized the Chronic Disease and Health Equity (CDHE) unit as the only Health Department in the state doing this innovative food system work, which is why they invited us to develop the LFPA proposal.
- 3. This proposal aims to support socially disadvantaged farmers and producers, maintain food quality along the supply chain, connect small-scale producers to historically underserved neighborhoods, and increase fresh produce to community members.
- 4. Farmworkers in the region receive some of the lowest wages—and the most minimal health care, retirement, and paid leave benefits—of any sector of our economy. Most farming jobs fail to provide an adequate standard of living which is particularly challenging in San Diego County where the cost of living is high. As a result, farmworkers, who are mostly people of color and immigrants, disproportionately depend on public benefits like Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).
- 5. Through the Local Food Purchase Assistance project, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors is committed to helping to attain viability of socially disadvantaged farmers and producers, specifically Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, as well as contribute to combating food insecurity in San Diego County.
- 6. The acceptance and implementation of Local Food Purchase Assistance (LFPA) funds aligns with several of the County of San Diego's Sustainability Goals including transitioning to a green, carbon free economy through improving the local farm to consumer supply chain and protecting the health and wellbeing of underserved communities through enhancing access to fresh, locally grown food. The funds also align with the goal of reducing pollution and waste through promoting locally sourced foods with lower growing and transportation emissions than mass-produced agriculture.
- 7. Authorize the acceptance of \$849,995 in grant funds from the California Department of Social Services for the period of September 1, 2022 through July 31, 2024, and to authorize the Clerk of the Board to execute all required documents, upon receipt, including any annual extensions, amendments, and/or revisions thereto that do not materially impact or alter the services or funding level Is COB signature required by the funding agency?
- 8. 2. Authorize the Agency Director, Health and Human Services Agency, to apply for additional funding opportunity announcements, if available, that address improvements of health equity for San Diego County residents.
