Dear Chair Nash and Commissioners,

The San Diego Immigrant Rights Consortium (SDIRC) is a coalition of approximately 50 diverse organizations across San Diego County that fights to protect and advance the human and civil rights of immigrants and refugees. Our organizational members come from the faith, legal, labor, and community sectors of justice work in our border region. As such they are very active and engaged with the immigrant community and border issues. SDIRC respectfully requests time during the Human Relations Commission August meeting to present on the illegal and inhumane detention of migrants that occurred in San Ysidro and Jacumba during the lifting of Title 42.

In the weeks leading up to Title 42 being lifted in May, AFSC San Diego and Friends of Friendship Park observed hundreds migrants being detained by Border Patrol in open air conditions between the layers of the border wall in San Ysidro. Individuals and families were held there for days, unable to leave, without food, water, shelter and access to bathrooms and showers. AFSC San Diego, Friends of Friendship Park, Alliance San Diego, Universidad Popular and other SDIRC members and partners quickly mobilized to bear witness and provide humanitarian aid at the site in San Ysidro. Later, Catholic Charities and Alliance San Diego were alerted that a similar situation was taking place in Jacumba, where over a thousand migrants were being detained outside by Border Patrol. SDIRC mobilized partners to assist the volunteers in Jacumba who were organizing water, food and supply drops.

The open air detention centers in San Ysidro and Jacumba escalated into a humanitarian crisis that reached national levels of concern. Due to the vigilance and quick response of civil society groups, we were able to prevent a public health nightmare and loss of life in our region. This is not the first humanitarian emergency in our region and it certainly will not be the last. We believe the County of San Diego has a role to play in future responses, and we would like to be able to present to the Commission to open discussion on how the County could potentially coordinate with non profits and provide resources for more effective responses in the future.
