Dear Supervisors and Fire District,

This project was approved by the last Board of Supervisors and staff in 2018. After the community and environmental groups sued the County and the developer, it was rescinded and the new board wisely chose not to appeal. Since then, much has changed. The wildfire landscape in California has gotten dramatically worse. The County issued new guidelines and a new Climate Action Plan that specifically avoids development in Very High Fire Severity Zones. This project violates all of that.

The state Attorney General weighed in on similar projects, questioning the wisdom of placing more homes in the "wildland urban interface." The AG also issued new guidelines. All of these things would negate the project. However, the County seems intent on moving forward.

Wildfres have become far more intense and frequent, and this year we've already crossed the million-acre mark. CalFire has even reclassified our entire area, including the proposed development, as a Very High Fire Severity Zone. It's clear that our valley is in more danger than ever, and yet this project doesn't account for those growing risks.

Our community has put together a wildfire evacuation plan, and it's clear that any new development would need to incorporate it into their planning. But HGV South seems to completely ignore that. The fact that the County already rejected Lilac Hills Ranch in Valley Center because of inadequate evacuation routes should be telling. That project had multiple ways out—this one only has one.

We understand that housing is needed and our community has dutifully accepted a more than doubling of housing in our community via the HGV project which we all supported. We testified in support of that project because the County promised us that this would be our contribution and that that would be it. Now, in retrospect, it seems as if HGVS was already foreseen despite the promised to the contrary.

Please do the right thing and vote against this project. The risks are too high for all of us.

Seven letters (ReI30 through ReI36 were submitted after the October 7, 2024 4:00 p.m. deadline for submittal of comments on recirculated Subchapter 2.7 and support documents.

As a result of late submittal, individual responses to each of the comments are not being authored. That does not mean, however, that the comments go unanswered. Two sets of three letters each are identical within their groups in substantive comments/statements. One set includes ReI30, ReI34, and ReI36; and one set includes ReI32, ReI33, and ReI35. One letter, ReI31, is not a repeat of the others. All of the letters, however, repeat topical concerns raised by others, often verbatim. These comments are therefore responded to as a group, with cross references to prior individual responses submitted within the sixweek comment period, for which full individual responses were provided, as appropriate.

The County appreciates the comments. Relative to 2018 approval of the Project "despite the clear guidance from independent experts" the County disagrees, as did the Court during the CEQA challenge to the Project. The safety analysis (wildfire risks and impact assessment as well as evacuation planning) was prepared by a team of County and emergency response professionals, as well as a qualified consultant on the topic. Detailed responses were provided to comments submitted on the Project in 2017 and 2018. Relative to restatements of issues about overall Project fire safety, access, egress, secondary access, etc., these issues were all subject to previous review/approval and not specifically part of the 2024 recirculation for which comments were solicited. For description of the scope of recirculation for this EIR pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15088.5(c), please see Response to Comment ReO6a-17 and the Recirculation Readers Guide, dated August 22, 2024. Prior safety analyses withstood qualified third-party review, and subsequently withstood CEQA challenge. Petitioners' assertions were not upheld by the Court (refer to Response to Comment ReI1-1 for Appellate Court conclusions regarding Project fire and evacuation safety analyses, as well as to Global Response: Res Judicata and New Information. To Whom It May Concern, The Revised EIR for the Harmony Grove Village South is inadequate for the following reasons: 1. The wildfire risk of this proposed development is simply too high. There are insufficient evacuation routes and it is impossible to add more, due to the steep, rugged terrain. The property is in a "Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone." The Cocos Fire burned right next to this property in 2014, burning 30 homes. 2. There is only one evacuation route from this property. To meet a minimum level of safety, there would have to be a second way out. But because of steep slopes in the area, there is no feasible way to build a road to create a second evacuation route. 3. Adding more people to this high-risk zone increases the risk to current residents as well as putting new residents at risk. 4. Instead of building here, we should be operating under the guidelines of the Fire Safe Infill Alternative, building homes close to villages and in urban centers. 5. By approving this development despite the obvious safety risks, the County is putting residents at risk, and is prioritizing profits over people. Due to changes in County regulations on Fire and Vehicle Miles Traveled since the original Final EIR was proposed in 2018, the Revised EIR is inadequate and should be required to do a new wildfire analysis and evacuation plan as well as being required to analyze VMTs. Response to Late Comment Rel37-1

Twenty-three communications were submitted by 21 commenters (ReI37 through ReI55) on two days in January (14 and 15), 2025. These letters were submitted after the October 7, 2024 deadline for submittal of comments on the Recirculated Final Environmental Impact Report (RFEIR), and are therefore late.

As a result of late submittal and consistency of comment content, individual responses to each of the comments are not being authored. That does not mean, however, that the comments go unanswered. Although the letters are not form letters, they are similar in content, with a number of identical passages. Similar to the late letters received in October (see ReI30) all of the letters repeat concerns raised by others, often verbatim. These comments are therefore responded to as a group, with cross references to prior individual responses submitted within the six-week comment period, as appropriate.

The County appreciates the comments. All of the letters provide some general information. Also often verbatim, this can include information regarding the writer; e.g., the location of their residence, whether they were present during the Cocos Fire (or other fire events in the area), what they and/or their neighbors experienced (including some explanatory pictures), if they were evacuated during the Cocos Fire and for how long that evacuation occurred, professional background, and/or emotional response to the January Los Angeles fires. Some comments also provide summary information about the Harmony Grove community, loss of structures in the Cocos fire (likely primarily from the Harmony Grove Spiritualist's Association), the writer's opinion regarding the Project developer goals/location/supposed actions, and difficulty in obtaining fire insurance and the expectation that it will be more difficult to do so given the Los Angeles fires. These statements can be of interest but they: (1) are not questions, and (2) do not relate to adequacy of the EIR prepared for the Project. Therefore, no responses are provided to these general information passages.

Our community dutifully supported HGV (not South) because the County promised us that this would fulfill our obligation to bring housing to our little rural community. Dahvia Lynch, the DCAO of land use and planning today, was the planner at the time and she held visioning workshops and diplomatically brought our community around to supporting a project that would double our population with 742 homes. We were assured by staff and by the Supervisors at the time that, due to the limited evacuation infrastructure and increased wildfire risk, this would be the last big project for a very long while. Not 2 years later, a Colorado billionaire buys up foreclosed land and embarks on a quest to undermine the community for the deceptively named Harmony Grove Village South. Ironically, that same billionaire lost his family home in 2022 during the Marshall fires.

If the HGV South project is approved there will be approximately six times more cars evacuating than we saw during Cocos fire, but no new road capacity. Something like 3500 vehicles will pack onto two-lane roads trying to escape a fast moving fire. According to an independent evacuation expert, it would take 7 hours to evacuate the immediate vicinity. A fire starting within 6 miles of us could overwhelm the community in less than 2 hours. I evacuated with the strike crews from this area as the flames raged in. It is violent and deadly and we know another brush fire is going to happen in this area as they do almost every 10 years like clockwork.

Please, the last Board got it wrong. I urge you to vote no on this dangerous project, or at the very least require a thorough new fire safety analysis and demand a secondary egress. Our lives and our pets' lives depend on it. When the next fire hits, you, as decision-makers, will live with the consequences of your ultimate decision. It will be your legacy. Let's hope it will be the right legacy.
