Dear San Diego County Supervisors,

San Diego Audubon Society recognizes that climate change is an existential threat to people, birds, other wildlife and their habitats worldwide. In San Diego County, human development fragments and impacts habitats every day. This project could certainly help to reduce our regions contribution to climate change. Our comments are directed at allowing it do that while not significantly diminishing this area's important wildlife movement value and wildlife habitat value especially for some at-risk species.

Resource Management Plan

The Conceptual Resource Management Plan is useful, but should be expanded to include more items that are essential. There should be an RMP for the solar panel area, as well as for the buffer area. Changes to the lands in the buffer area and in the solar panel area could be very detrimental to local wildlife if not also managed well. This includes invasive weed control (which will also reduce the likelihood of wildfires), and ensuring that vegetation is not removed entirely, which could contribute to higher rates of erosion and would remove important resources for wildlife. The implementation of the RMP and the subsequent management of the buffer and solar areas would be the responsibility of the solar array operators.

Figure 5 in the Conceptual Resource Management Plan doesn't record any birds on the proposed solar project site, only in the easement area. Please provide a map of the species that were found in the area proposed for solar panels?

Burrowing Owls were observed overwintering in the Study Area. We urge that they be added to the RMP as a species that is monitored and managed. Burrowing Owls are ground nesting bird. Managing for them will help minimize the impact of losing the solar panel area as nesting or overwintering sites. They are on the decline in the County. Efforts should be made to encourage their occupation in the solar area as well as in the buffer area.

The RMP should be expanded to specify fencing and vegetation cover that would allow wildlife to move through and/or occupy the solar area as well as the buffer area.

The RMP should identify a lighting system that will allow nocturnal wildlife movement through both the solar and the buffer areas and that will not provide an unnatural advantage to nocturnal predators. To provide adequate security the lighting might need to be augmented by infrared, radar, or ground vibration sensor systems.

Tricolored Blackbirds

San Diego Audubon urges that the environmental benefits of this project be improved by conducting a research project to better understand the effects of solar projects on Tricolored Blackbirds (*Agelaius tricolor*). Tricolored blackbirds are a listed species in the San Diego Management and Monitoring Plan. They are especially sensitive to loss of their breeding areas, which are characterized as areas that include open accessible water, a protected nesting substrate with flooded or thorny/spiny vegetation, and suitable foraging space within a few kilometers. It appears as though this area must meet these requirements, as they have used this area for over 50 years.

Little is known about the interactions between Tricolored Blackbirds and photovoltaic solar installations throughout the state. With the expansion of clean energy, we will see more installations of solar projects like this. This project can act as an important and informative source of information for future similar projects. This would be done by documenting the use by Tricolored Blackbirds before construction, vs. the use by Tricolored Blackbirds during construction, over the first two years of operation, and for one out of every four years after that for the first sixteen years of operation. It would require a monitoring protocol to be worked out by a research team, and would dovetail with the ongoing monitoring as well as that described in the existing RMP. We strongly encourage the applicant to set aside funding and time to support the collection of needed scientific information to help build, design and permit better photovoltaic projects in the future.

We also encourage the applicant to double the buffer width in the southeastern portion of the parcel, because this is where tricolored blackbirds have been recorded foraging and might be an important location for their continued existence in the Jacumba area.

Community Impacts

We urge that the design, construction, and operation of this facility take all reasonable measures to not degrade the economic, quality of life, and health of the community and residents of Jacumba Hot Springs. If projects like this get a reputation of being more intrusive

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than necessary, that reputation could make it more difficult for our region and our nation to take the measures needed to reduce our discharge of Green House Gases.

Community Solar

The JVR project does not benefit the local community directly. The project should sponsor a grant and/or installation program to bring rooftop solar panels to the residents and businesses of Jacumba, if they are interested. Adding this environmental justice component to the project would improve it with very little downside. This would provide a tangible community benefit from the project and would provide more renewable energy and lower our carbon footprint.

Backup power for the surrounding community

Power to our backcountry areas is occasionally shut-off because of power-line failures or to reduce fire risk. We urge that this solar installation include the capability to provide twenty-four hour power directly to the Jacumba Hot Springs area in situations where this community is not getting power from the rest of the grid.

Urban Siting for Solar Energy

We urge that much greater effort and investment be put toward urban solar energy such as rooftop and parking lot solar facilities for a large number of environmental reasons. These urban sources do not require long transmission lines with their fire risks, environmental impacts from installation and maintenance, and Green House Gas emissions from installation, maintenance, and associated vehicle mileage. They do not take land that is important for wildlife habitat, recreation, and scenic value. They do not a labyrinth of service roads and staging areas, which degrade our watersheds. They do not require wind turbines, which also kill our declining populations of birds and bats in huge numbers. We urge that the County put a lot more pressure on the energy companies to address our green energy needs through urban roof-top and parking lot solar facilities.

Please notify San Diego Audubon about further updates, or major milestones on this issue.

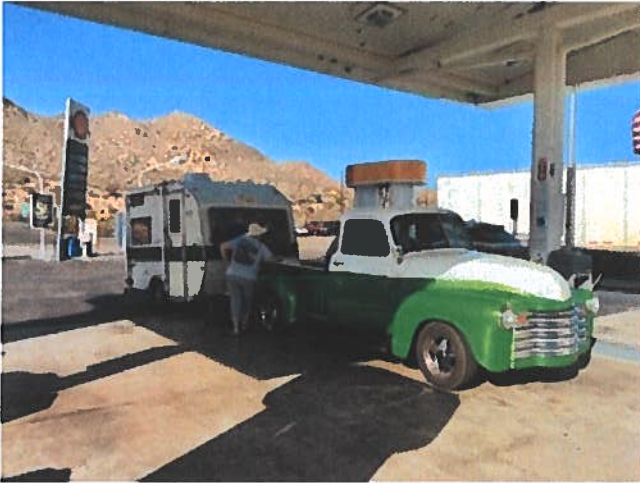

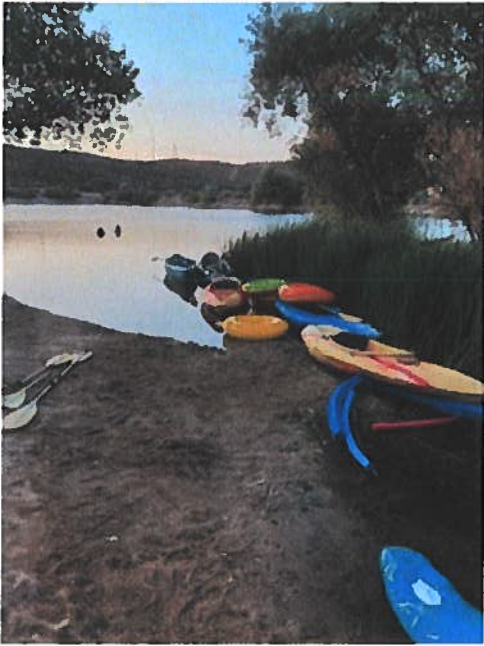

Jacumba is one of San Diego County's most economically challenged communities with a median household income of \$26,636 – 39% of the State's median household income. Jacumba is one of the last affordable places to live in California, and is facing the prospect of being swallowed up by the JVR solar mega-project.

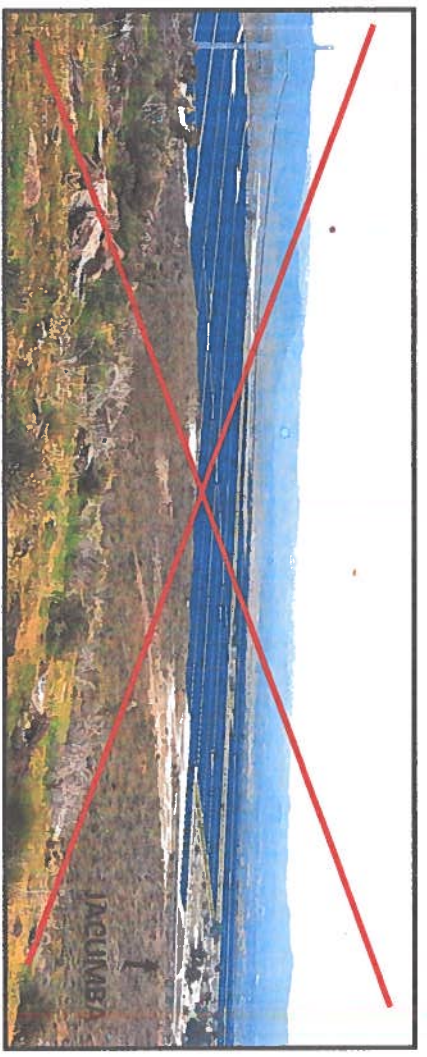
