Re: JVR Energy Park Project (PDS2018-MUP-18-022), and the coming public hearing on August 18th.

Dear Supervisors Anderson, Vargas, Lawson-Remer, Fletcher and Desmond;

This letter is to express my views about the JVR Energy Park project proposed for Jacumba California.

Background

I have been a licensed Landscape Architect in the State of California, practicing in San Diego County since 1988. I also have a BS degree in Natural Resources Planning from Humboldt State University. I do not live in Jacumba, nor do I have any financial stake or property in the area, although I know many people and spend time there. I am also a strong supporter of the concept of renewable energy generation. My only motivation to write this letter is my love for the back country of San Diego County and a respect for the people who live there.

In addition to my familiarity with the Jacumba area, I spent over 16 years designing and overseeing construction of 40 acres of landscaped grounds for the Rancho La Puerta fitness resort, as well as a Soccer Field/ Public Park in Tecate, Mexico, about 30 miles away. I have also served on the Community Forest Advisory Board (CFAB) for the City of San Diego for the last 5 years.

I would like to make two major points about the JVR Solar Energy Park project;

- 1) The siting of a large industrial facility, which is what this is, in a rural area with high scenic landscape value would be a tragic, irreversible land use decision. You should be aware of the proposed revival of the historic Jacumba Hot Springs, immediately to the West of the project, which could likely trigger an economic resurgence in this economically disadvantaged area. It's scenic value has already been degraded by 2 recent and somewhat unwelcome infrastructure projects; the border wall and the Sunrise Power Link. What makes this project particularly egregious is that there is no inherent, compelling reason for having a solar farm here as opposed to other, less scenic and visible locations. As far as I'm aware, the sun shines equally here as it does in the vast flat and disturbed landscapes further East towards El Centro. The only impetus that I can see for this location is that some land speculators stand to make a large profit at the expense of the quality of life for local residents.
- 2) Given that the momentum seems to be on the side of approval, for whatever reasons, I would like to comment on the proposed landscape mitigation, which is my area of expertise. According to the Final EIR, a whole 15' has been allotted for landscape

screening in addition to a fence around the project. From a design point of view, the reason the facility needs to be screened is to disguise a huge, clearly man-made rectilinear feature in a landscape of undulating hills and a mosaic of vegetation types, geologic features and small scale built structures. A 15' wide 'landscape buffer' would do nothing to reduce the visual impact of this facility. Instead, there would only be space for completely linear plantings of trees and shrubs. Furthermore, because this narrow strip would be relatively close to the panels, no large trees could be used. The end result would be that the planting would reinforce, not soften, the visual impact of the facility by adding additional layers of linearity. To be serious about visual mitigation, the landscaped buffer zone should at minimum be expanded to 75-100' wide, so that larger trees like native oaks and sycamores can be planted in irregular, naturalistic groupings, with in-between spaces planted with evergreen chaparral shrubs such as Toyon, Holly-leaf cherry and Sugar Bush (*Rhus ovata*). In addition, the greatest reduction in visual impact would be achieved if the panels were shifted as far as possible from Old Highway 80 and towards the N.E. corner of the site.

Thank you for this opportunity to express my concerns.

Dear Supervisor Jim Desmond and the San Diego County Board of Supervisors,

The Tubb Canyon Desert Conservancy (TCDC) was established to preserve desert habitat and biodiversity, to protect native plants and wildlife, and to promote understanding of these special places. TCDC focuses on the importance of natural desert ecosystems existing in harmony with established desert communities. We believe this balance is in the long-term best interest of residents and businesses in San Diego County. The proposed **Jacumba Solar Project (JVR Solar – PDS2018-MUP-18-022)** seriously threatens this balance for the unincorporated community of Jacumba and the surrounding Sonoran Desert habitat.

We stand with the many residents of the small town of Jacumba who oppose the proposed Jacumba Solar Project at any scale because of the damage it would inflict on this small community's economic future. The industrial-scale solar facility as currently planned would be a visual blight located in too close proximity to rural homes. This adverse impact *cannot be mitigated*. The heat island effect the proposed project would generate, along with the massive and ongoing water required to maintain the output of photovoltaic panels, would threaten Jacumba's future ability to draw economically on seasonal tourism once construction begins and for the lifetime of the proposed project -- followed by any renewals of the project -- into the indeterminate future. Jacumba is an economically disadvantaged community whose residents have few resources to effectively oppose such an intrusive development that would jeopardize their well-being. Based on discussions with an organization representing Jacumba residents, **we believe that imposing the Jacumba Solar Project on their community would constitute economic and environmental injustice.**

TCDC enthusiastically supports development of new solar generating capacity when installed on existing structures at, or close to, the point of use. Like thousands of San Diego County residents, and millions of tourists from around the world, we view any natural desert viewshed, watershed and ecosystem as valuable. Viewsheds, ecosystems, aquifers, and associated natural flora and fauna are all valuable resources that should not be sacrificed for some other “higher purpose.” Such a “higher purpose” is often in the eyes and pocketbook of a clever, typically non-resident “investor” who hopes to make a handsome profit without considering the devastating cost to nearby long-term residents. The economic term for impacts on others is “externalities,” that is, impacts that cost the investor nothing, but which costs are born by those external to the funding for, and revenue from, a particular endeavor. It is particularly easy for a shrewd out-of-town developer to “roll over” the interests of long-term, low-income local residents, especially Native peoples and other peoples of color, veterans, and seniors. Developers know the decision-makers, and sometimes make handsome campaign contributions. All these advantages are typically out of reach for rural townspeople who depend on the local natural beauty for their livelihood and their rural location for their physical and mental health.

At first glance, massive solar panel arrays in the desert seem to make a lot of sense. However, the factors of temperature, transmission distance, and the water resources needed to keep panels clean, all need to be accounted for in order to calculate the true economic and societal benefit of any particular installation. Electrical generation near the point of use—on residential, warehouse, parking lot, and other developed land and structures—is typically the best choice in Southern California. The biggest benefit of a desert location for solar panels is the high percentage of direct sunshine while the sun is up, compared to communities under coastal influence having greater fog and cloud cover. This advantage is offset by the fact that solar cells lose efficiency as ambient and surface temperatures increase. In the desert, surface temperatures on the ground and on solar panels of more than 150°F can be experienced daily during summer and autumn months. **Because solar panel efficiencies begin to fall when surface temperatures exceed 60 – 70°F, more than a quarter of a solar panel’s efficiency can be sapped during the high desert temperatures** that frequently exist between ~10:00AM to ~5:00PM when the sun is providing the most illumination onto solar panels. Averaged over a year, this effect can eliminate some, if not all, of the advantage provided by the fact there are more cloud-free days in the desert versus coastal regions in Southern California.

Solar panel farms also create local heat islands when winds are relatively calm. While solar panels generate electricity from the sunlight they absorb, only a fraction of this energy is exported off-site through wires as electricity; **the majority of the energy remains on-site because solar panels at best convert to electricity only about one-third of the solar energy they absorb.** Solar panels are darker than most desert terrain (except for lava fields in a few locations), thus they absorb more energy than typical natural desert surfaces in Southern California. So, the problem of heat is two-fold. First, the heat effect reduces solar panel efficiency as noted above. Second, to the extent the proposed industrial-scale solar farm creates a heat island in a community where ambient summer temperatures ordinarily exceed 110°F, this heat island effect could pose a serious danger for those residents living near the proposed facility. No solar energy generating project should increase health risks and decrease property values for those living and working around it.

Finally, the dry desert presents two more problems for solar panels. First, there are **frequent wind-borne dust events that leave deposits on solar panels that reduce their efficiency by as much as 40%**. Frequent cleaning can reduce these losses, but that cleaning requires *water*, which, by definition, is in short supply in the desert. **An industrial-scale solar panel farm can require as much water for cleaning panels to maintain efficiency (insofar as that is possible when panels are hot) as all the water used by a small community.** Depending on the local hydrology, the water draw for cleaning solar panels could hasten the decline of the local water table, requiring local residents to drill deeper wells, if they can afford to, in order to maintain access to water they have had for decades. The alternative of “trucking in water” adds cost, damages roads, increases air pollution, and adds tanker truck traffic and noise to an otherwise quiet and peaceful small town.

Lastly, siting the proposed Jacumba Solar Project in the middle of a desert floodplain and riparian habitat susceptible to both flash floods and strong seismic events, and located adjacent to Anza-Borrego Desert State Park and BLM lands, both of which harbor several endangered and declining species, is a patently bad idea for all the obvious reasons that have been elaborated by others.

Thank you for consideration of this request to *deny* approval of the proposed Jacumba Solar Project, for the sake of the small community of Jacumba and the larger issues raised here, including that of grid reliability and security, reduction in wildfire risk, and to protect desert lands, wildlife and scenic vistas.

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

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

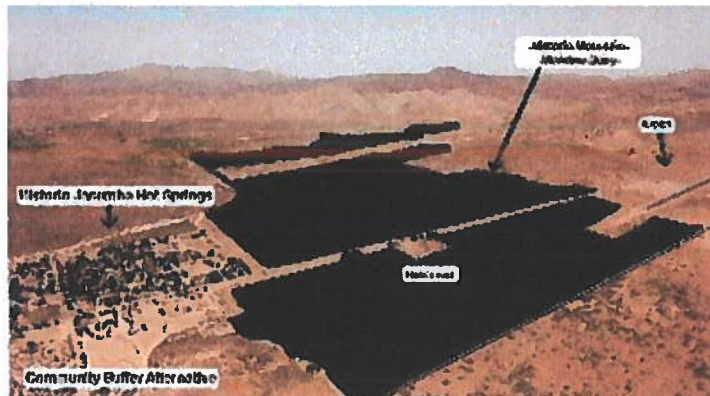

As you consider the approval of the massive 600-acre JVR solar park adjacent to private residences, a scenic Highway 80, and around three sides of the Jacumba airport, you must consider carefully the unmitigable impacts the this project will have on the future existence of this tiny town. My husband and I, both in our 60's, moved to Jacumba Hot Springs in March of 2020, just as Covid was hitting, before the masks, and before the quarantine. It just so happened it came at a time that housing prices were going through the roof, but they were still being purchased shortly after hitting the market. We were so very thankful when our Realtor found us our home. We absolutely love it here in Jacumba Hot Springs. We love the true "Green," the Clean Green Environment.

We were so excited to find affordable housing. Our rent in a single family home was going up \$800.00 a month which was more than we could afford. We had taken good care of the home so the increased rent was not hard for the owner to receive. There were literally no homes available in our area that we could afford on our income, in an area that was safe for us to live, and safe for our cars, free from theft and vandalism that had infiltrated into the area where we were living and moving from. So we went East after looking at all the surrounding areas, any affordable housing had some level of leasing fee for the land and maintenance. We are not in a financial position to pay for a mortgage and HOA Fees, PUD Fees, CAM Fees, etc. Fees that are always rising. So we went further East, we both work in El Cajon, we did not have any interest in going any further east than Jacumba Hot Springs. What we did know, after renting the same home for nine years and having no control over rent increases, we knew we needed to purchase a home, not on leased land with fees, in a safe environment, and at a payment we could afford with our income at our age. We found this in Jacumba Hot Springs! Sure it's a bit rugged here and there, nothing that some redevelopment can't repair, particularly in the main areas.

We love the sound of children playing, dogs barking, barbecues in the summer, and fireplaces in the winter. Some may call us desolate, sleepy, or back country, but we are here loving clean air, beautiful mountain views, peace, and serenity. Please stand for us, the people, tax paying citizens of the United States of America. Say No to this massive solar production plant (JVR Energy Park)!

Please look at the project proposed: JVR Energy Park (a solar production plant) from the perspective of the people. The residents of the community/village of Historical Jacumba Hot Springs, under new ownership, new owners of the Jacumba Hot Springs Spa, Restaurant, Bar, and Motel. We are also new homeowners, as are a few others, as well as renters, Covid hit just after we moved in, then everyone was quarantined. We never had a chance to get to know people due to Covid concerns. I'm high risk so I need to be particularly careful.

I have a job that is essential so I started working remotely from our home in Jacumba Hot Springs immediately after moving in. We have high speed internet, and satellite services available. I still work remotely and have been approved to continue. I work with an awesome team remotely connecting nurses to doctors, doctors to patients, patients to doctors, pharmacies to doctors, and many other types of non 911 emergencies throughout the country. We have a diverse community. And yes, way out here in the East Empire Mountains of San Diego County, in the tiny community/village of Jacumba Hot Springs!

We have our own Fire Department, Post Office, Library, Water Company, General Store, and the Jacumba Hot Springs Restaurant, Spa, Bar, and Motel under new ownership along with the Jacumba Hot Springs Historical Bath House that is intended to be restored and used for Venues, we have our Jacumba Lake, Gas Stations, and our own Airport! It is really cool to watch the gliders in the sky from the airport.

Please take into consideration:

The size: This project is massive! Our community/village has already done their part, we already have two major renewable energy developments, the 70 acre ECO Substation and the 100+ acre Jacumba Solar Project, and three high voltage lines running through our village, the Sunrise PowerLink, the Southwest Powerlink and the Boulevard 148K V Link. This does not include being surrounded by windmills.

Air Port - This JVR Solar Park proposal consumes our glider airport. The glider airport is quiet, environmentally friendly, and fun to watch!

Wild Life - The birds, we have so many beautiful birds of all sizes that are also amazing to enjoy! Many of these treasured birds will burst into flames when they encounter the ridiculous amount of solar panels used in the production plant! This is not the location for this power plant! This is only the birds! This doesn't include the devastation to the other wildlife in the area!

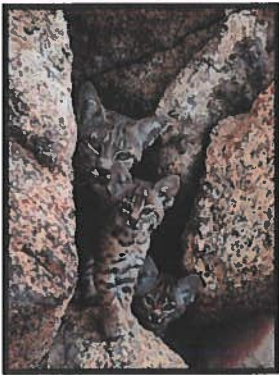
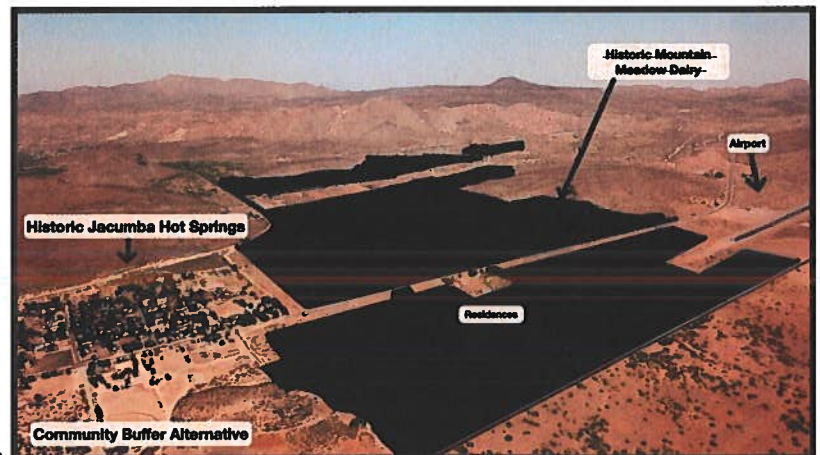
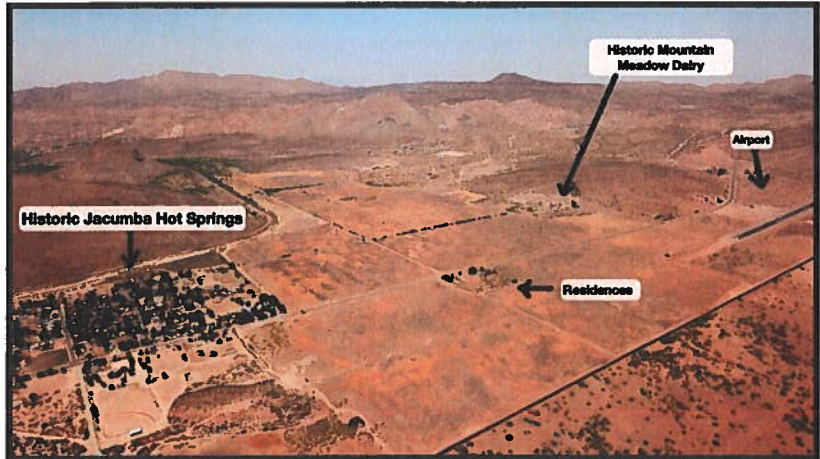

To the Board of Supervisors and their land use staffs:

I am reaching out to you today, to ask you to vote to deny the proposed 600-acre Jacumba Valley Ranch (JVR) solar project. At six times the size of our small village, its placement within our rural village boundary will devastate the quality of life for the poor and underserved residents of Jacumba Hot Springs. If approved as is at the August 18th Board of Supervisors' hearing, this facility will:

- Consume all the best former farmland which would be better used to support a viable future for the town.

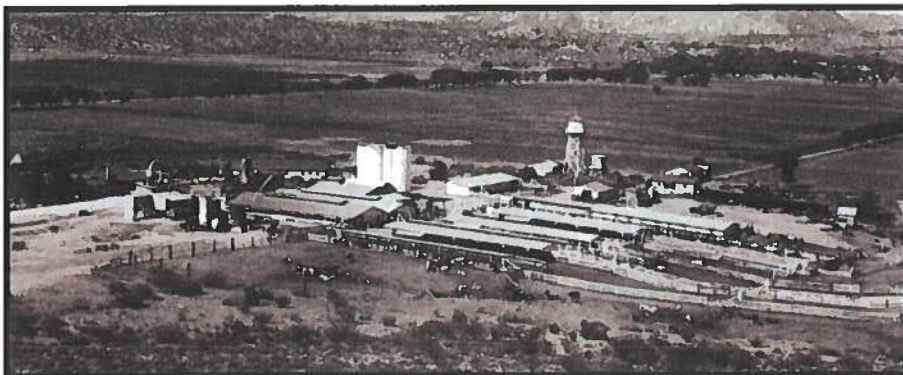
- Place high voltage electrical components including 280,000 PV modules, 75 large (potentially flammable) lithium batteries, inverters, transformers, a large collector substation and a huge switchyard adjacent to private residences, along two sides of scenic Hwy 80, and around three sides of the Jacumba Airport runway. See before and after visuals of the JVR project area right. (Note, the blackened areas would be covered by the solar facility.)



- Permanently displace local wildlife, following a 13 month-long construction

period, when up to 500 workers per day will be using heavy equipment to move 280,000 cubic-yards of earth, driving in solar panel pilings, etc.

- Demolish significant historical resources—The former Mountain Meadow Dairy, which operated from the late 1920s to mid-1950s, was Jacumba's biggest employer and the largest dairy in the county. (See 1940 dairy photo.) A variety of raptors, including golden eagles routinely use the trees and grain silos at the dairy farm as roosts.



—Impact the safety of glider and single engine aircraft operations at our local Jacumba airport runway because it will be surrounded on three sides with electrical solar components, raised well above grade due to their location in a floodplain. This means the component tops will be at 15 feet. (See 2014 photo which shows summer flooding south of Highway 80 near the airport.)

—Industrialize our exceptionally quiet rural landscape with mechanical noise and unmitigable visual blight.

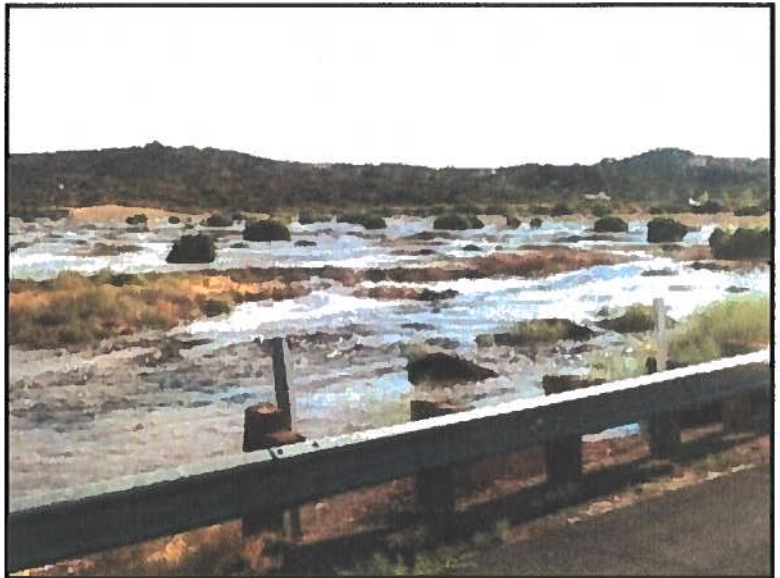
—Destroy future tourism and local job creation that would result if the town had room to expand.

—Elevate ambient temperatures in our town as much as 15 degrees F due to the heat island effect associated with utility-scale solar farms. (We have already had temperatures in the 110 degree range this month.)

Jacumba is not against green energy, we already have 108 acres of operational solar panels and a 58-acre ECO Electrical Substation just east of our town. We have been asking the JVR solar developer to compromise on the size and location of the project to no avail. In fact, our community developed a reasonable alternative called the “Equity for Jacumba Alternative,” that would move the project away from residences, the scenic highway, and airport. This alternative would still allow the permitting of the largest solar project in San Diego County while allowing a “way forward” for our community.

There is no need to destroy the quality of life for the residents of Jacumba, many of whom are disabled veterans and seniors living on small fixed incomes. **Where is the social equity and environmental justice for Jacumba, or are those terms only applied to urban communities?**

You don't have to approve a poorly planned project that takes advantage of an extremely poor and diverse community. Please stand up for Jacumba and vote to deny the 600-acre JVR project!!!
