The Initial Meeting

- What is the purpose and importance of the initial meeting?
 -To establish a foundation for rehabilitation and accountability.
- During the initial meeting we do the following:
 - Role clarification
 - Review court orders
 - Gather and verify information

What is role clarification

Steps to Role Clarification

- Identify what the Probation goals for the supervision process
- Ask the offender to identify what he/she hopes to accomplish during the supervision process
- Identify what your role is as an officer and what you hope to accomplish
- Define the supervision process
- Identify and discuss the expectation of confidentiality

Why is it important to explain terms and conditions to the probationer

- Establishes basis for supervision
- Clarifies that we are enforcing court mandates
- Clarifies any questions or concerns
- Legally, it is our job!

Legal Obligations

Legal obligations a court order places upon the probation officer

- To inquire on and maintain a complete record of the following information: "the age, sex, nativity, residence, education, habits of temperance, marital status, and the conduct, employment, occupation, parents' occupation, and the condition of the person committed to his or her care during the term of probation, and the result of probation." (PC1203.7(b))
- To provide the Probationer with a copy of their Probation Conditions (PC1203.7(d))

General Conditions and Special Conditions

General

- 4th Amendment Waiver
- Follow PO directives
- Weapons
- No drugs and alcohol *
- DNA Collection

Special

- Registrations
- Stay Away Orders
- Temporary Restraining Orders
- Classes
- Gang
- American Society of Addiction Medicine Assessment

Setting up the interview

How do we contact the Probationer to schedule their initial appointment?

Contacting the Probationer

- Mail
- Telephone
- Home visit
- Through a relative

Meeting Location

- Office
- Neutral Setting (For example: Work, School, Treatment Program, Jail/Juvenile Hall)
- Offender's Home

Why Review the Case File before the interview?

- To have knowledge of who the Probationer is
- It will help us develop interview questions (maybe some info is missing in our records, or the info is very vague)
- Our goal is to gain as much knowledge about our Probationer in order to understand the clients background, history, behaviors, security alerts, etc.

What information are we looking for and where?

Case File

- Review the Pre-Sentence Investigation reports and the Juvenile Social Study report
- Review Court Orders (may have more than 1 Probation case)
- Review assessment results
- Review the RAP Sheet

PCMS

- Contact notes
- Addresses and phone numbers
- Other documents in PCMS may also be useful

Release of Information Forms

Why do we need them? So we can have access to the following:

- Medical records
- Mental health records
- Treatment program records
- School records

Have them ready for signatures

- How to engage?

Documents the Probationer Should Provide to PO During the Initial Meeting:

- Completion of Court Ordered Program Certificates
- Attendance to AA/NA Meetings
- Proof of Employment
- Proof of Enrollment in School
- Identification
- What others can you think of?

Verifying ID & Contact Information

Verify Probationer's Identity

- Driver's license, Cal ID, School ID, Passport
- Social Security Card
- Birth Certificate

Verifying the Probationer's contact information

- Probation reports
- Police reports
- Family, relatives, friends

Importance of Pictures
