Commissioners.


October 22 and November 5, 2020 The selected eight Commissioners will meet to choose the remaining six





1. What experience do you possess that demonstrates analytical skills relevant to the redistricting process and voting rights, and demonstrates your ability to comprehend and apply the applicable state and federal legal requirements?


I have taken courses as a college student that covered advanced mathematics, statistics and computer

science. As a graduate student, I completed additional classes in advanced statistics, marketing and operations research and more computer science. I have encountered a wide variety of experiences that required me to use those concepts and ideas in my personal, military and work lives. I have had extensive work experience in computer operations and some experience with database analysis. All these experiences have resulted in my being sought out by others as a source of information on areas such as computers, business operations, finance and life in general. I have assisted in creating business plans and developing the financial projections to allow the business to be successful. I have analyzed marketing, inventory and financial data to determine company direction, requirements and viability, I have also been able to call upon these skills to start and maintain my own company providing communications and computer consulting services to the US government and military services and those of other countries since 2006. I have also spent a large amount of time mentoring many of the junior officers and personnel I have worked with during my military and civilian careers. My Navy experience required me to take the details of advanced logistics requirements, transportation systems and manpower availability into account then to develop a plan of action to meet the mission objects. In two different major operational cases, my unit was tasked with offloading 1000+ containers and 100s of pieces of palletized equipment and motorized vehicles from a cargo vessel in a foreign port. In the first case, the equipment was off loaded and then transported to a distant facility and stored away in a warehouse. The second case, in a different country, required that materials previously stored ashore were moved to the port to be loaded onto the ship. Simultaneously the ship was being off loaded and equipment moved to be warehoused to replace the items being shipped out. In both cases as the Operations Officer, it was my task to develop and manage the operational plans to complete the missions. I was required to interact with US and foreign military and civilian personnel to arrange berthing, meals, equipment, and

transportation for people and equipment at the foreign sites. I was required to determine manpower needs and assignments for those doing the work. I had to coordinate with the shipping managers to determine arrival and departure times for the vessels involved. Finally we needed to insure that all people and equipment were on site and ready to go at the required times. As this was a Reserve Unit assignment, although I had a staff to work with, a large portion of the task and most of the documentation fell to me. The fact we were able to successfully and on time complete these missions was a result of applying all of the

analytical, logical and planning tools and abilities available to me, and my team.


2. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an ability to be impartial?

I feel that to be impartial is one of the easiest ideas to hold and the hardest to actually practice. To me impartiality means following a series of steps to reach decisions and outcomes that are best for all, regardless of personal and group bias. The first step is to be able to think through a situation from all sides and being open to alternate possibilities. Next a determination of the best outcome for the situation is made and a plan created to meet the objective. Unfortunately, in the end, some people will likely have only a few or none of their requirements met. Some may receive more than they require. However, the end result should be that as a whole, the entire group should be better off over the long haul. This is the basis of our Representative Democracy and the ideal that our elected officials should strive to meet. The hardest individual piece of the puzzle is that each person will be required to overcome their own thoughts and biases to be able to see the way to that common end result. It is often hardest to acknowledge that what you want or what you believe in is not conducive to finding that common solution. At that point, the truly impartial find a way to step outside themselves and agree that the best conclusion is the one that serves best in spite of personal reservations.

Many times as a Military Officer I have been in a position to have to make impartial decisions. Things such as who gets holiday leave or who gets the good assignments are the most numerous and non-stressful. However, there is always a time when decisions are required that are not only unpopular but also potentially dangerous or deadly. Who gets the holiday work shift, who goes down into the ship's hold to check an alarm, and most important, and the one I have been faced with personally, deciding who gets to escort the detection team through the spaces to investigate a bomb threat. Fortunately there was no bomb.

I have always tried to be as impartial as possible in all situations and feel that I have been successful in that endeavor. I feel that one of my strengths is the ability to empathize with others and to see all sides before making any decisions. I have also learned that there are times when others make the decision and although I may personally disagree, I have been able to follow and act upon those decisions that were morally and honorably derived. As a former military officer I realize the obligation to follow orders, but also the moral responsibility to follow only those that are truly lawful, as is the real meaning of the oath.

3. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an appreciation for the diverse demographics and geography of the County of San Diego?




