D. Experience Qualifications

State law requires candidates demonstrate experience in areas related to redistricting. Please provide responses to the following questions.

1. What experience do you possess that demonstrates analytical skills relevant to the redistricting process and voting rights, and demonstrates your ability to comprehend and apply the applicable state and federal legal requirements?

I have several qualifications that I believe allow me to be qualified candidate for the Independent redistricting commission based upon the following:

- 1) I come from a family of individuals serving in various commission roles in Los Angeles County. I have worked as an advisor to Ms. Dolly Morrison (mother) on numerous projects for the City of Inglewood where she has served in District 4 as a Facilities Commissioner, Seniors advisor to the Mayor of Inglewood. Also, advised her as a community member on the authorization committee of new corporate enterprises in Inglewood, CA and its impact on local community demographics, traffic, housing, property taxes, etc.
- 2) I have served as a voter registration volunteer with Aliance San Diego, and served as a volunteer for Dr. Shirley Weber during her service as a District E School Board member and throughout her service to date as an Assembly member of the 79th District. My experience also includes volunteer service with LaShae Collins and Dr. LaWana Richmond in their campaign efforts to represent District E on the San Diego School Board as well.
- 3) As Chair of the Black Studies Department at San Diego Mesa College and instructor for courses such as BLAS 140A & BLAS 140B U.S. History from a Black Perspective and BLAS 116 Contemporary Social Problems I utilizes a review of historical and contemporary issues and dynamics affecting voting policies, practices, demographics to inform the projects requiring students to analyze data to gain a better understanding of past, present and potential future trends that have and/or could impact the social and political health and well beingness of the Black Community in San Diego and the nation at large. Curriculm projects for BLAS 116 are designed to help students identify specific community challenges and development of community action plans from data analysis that includes use of appropriate public and private funding sources and timelines for immediate realtime application.
- 4) In 2016, I co-authored a grant for the San Diego Ambassadors Program that was submitted to and approved for \$250,000 by the San Diego District Attorney's Office in 2017. This was one of the largest awards distributed to address community upliftment and recidivism within the 4th District.
- 5) Lastly, I just completed my Ed.D. in Educational Leadership from San Diego State University where I conducted n extensive qualitative study on the KEYS TO STEM SUCCESS: The Black Studies Effect. This included an impact analysis upon the immediate community of SD Mesa College and its underreprsented student population, particularly among African diasporan. Special emphasis focused upon 3rd Space Theory and it impact upon student learning ecologies through the lens of intersectionality of 1st Space Home/Community and 2nd Space Work/Academics.

The experiences listed above provide a small example of activities that I believe effectively inform my ability and commitment to be in service to my District, District 4, the Diamond District.

2. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an ability to be impartial?

- 1) As a community college employee I am required to serve on numberous campus committies that include faculty/administrator hiring, student club advising, Flex Workshops for professional development and membership with the Cultural Diversity for Inclusion and Equity Committee. Additional roles requiring my ability to also be fair and impartial include service as a Senator in the Academic Senate, along with my position as a Board Member for the National Council for Black Studies.
- 2) Likewise, I am one of the founding members of the San Diego Ambassadors Program and founder of the Roots Scholars Program. Both of these programs provide opportunities to help cultivate equity mindedness among the youth and young adults of San Diego but also among the support networks that extend the social and cultural capital to them.
- 3) As the Chair of Black Studies at San Diego Mesa College for over 10 years now, working routinely and effectively with diverse populations of students, faculty and administrators requires a lot of patience, vision, creativity, integrity and impartiality in order to achieve compromise when needed and to always get the job done. My living moto is "once the job is once begun, never leave it till its done. Do the job big or small, do it well or not at all."

3. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an appreciation for the diverse demographics and geography of the County of San Diego?

- 1) First and foremost, as the Chair of Black Studies at San Diego Mesa College I have had the opportunity to bare witness to what inclusion looks like when it is done intensionally and with respect. As the smallest department at Mesa College, we have one of the most diverse student populations across our campus. As such, on any given day you can look at our enrollments and find a wide variety of people from all over the world taking our classes. This includes having a commitment to embracing, learning from and from that coming to appreciate other cultures so that effective bridging and meaning making can be cultivated in the exchange of experiences and information about ones self and others.
- 2) As an educator for over 35 years, I have participated in, organized and conducted numous workshops, trainings and conferences on servicing and supporting underrepresented students and the communities they are apart of primarilty within San Diego, varying parts of Los Angeles County and the state of California. I am required to maintain my Equal Employment Opportunity certification with the San Diego Community College District and am an alumni of the Community Based Block graduate program at San Diego State University which specializes in cultural competency training for counselors and educators.
- 3) I would have to say that my greatest experience with diversity appreciation has come from being a mother of four children in South East San Diego. All througout their youth I supported them and their teachers in their classroom experiences; was a co-leader of Girl Scout Troop #5305 from kindergarden through highschool; Team Mom for my sons Track, Football and Basket Teams while serving as a parent representative on their schools SSCs and SGTs. From this experience I was able to have enduring relationships with co-workers who as parents and neighbors who also served in these capacities. That network was one of the most rewarding experiences for me as an adult. Ilt reaffirmed the payoff of working hard for what you believe in and I have been able to apply the lessons learned from those leadership positions in virtually every other aspect of my personal and professional life. As a parent representative I testified on numerous times before the State Board of Education in Sacramento. This taught me the intricacies of decision making and I have never regretted it. It challenged me to work hard for what I believed in and for the interests of all children, not just my own. The rewards have been fulfilling and life changing. This experience also taught me that anything is possible when you believe in the power of people!
