State law requires candidates demonstrate experience in areas related to redistricting. Please provide responses to the following questions.

- 1. What experience do you possess that demonstrates analytical skills relevant to the redistricting process and voting rights, and demonstrates your ability to comprehend and apply the applicable state and federal legal requirements?
 - 1. I am an active voter in all local and national elections. I am a past member of the League of Women Voters in Long Beach, CA and have good understanding of voting rights.
 - 2. I am competent in basic math skills and computer skills for spreadsheets and word processing.
 - 3. I am aware of mapping software from my experience as a participant in public hearings for the City of Oceanside city council district initiative. I have lived in Oceanside since 2007.
 - 4. I am able to review relevant regulations and formulate guidance for compliance. As a Quality Manager, I was tasked with applying federal regulations to formulate a plan for regulatory compliance.
 - 5. In performing quality audits in the biotech industry, I developed the skills to determine how much information to collect to support evidence of compliance as well as to filter out irrelevant facts.
 - 6. I have a Master Degree in Public Administration, a study in government structure, rules and policies. I understand the distinct levels of governance and regulations that apply to cities, counties, special districts, state and federal entities. I understand that there are different regulating bodies that oversee functions of each level of government.
 - 7. I am aware of diversity issues that need to be considered when reviewing demographic information for creating districts. I am fluent in Spanish and I understand there are unique cultural distinctions for the diverse latinx populations.
 - 8. As the Director of Clinical Collaboration, I collected personal and clinical information on subjects for approved research. I understand the patient protection rights and regulations concerning collection of personal information.
 - 9. I have learned to conduct community meetings and to reach common objectives. I made formal presentations of information.
 - 10. I participated in the Point In Time Count of the Homeless, San Diego County, Jan 2017 as a volunteer. I am aware of the issues in homelessness in the county.
 - 11. I understand the impact and implications for the census information applied to redistricting.

2. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an ability to be impartial?

One's ability to be impartial requires remaining conscious that one does have prejudices, opinions, biases and experiences that affect decision making. To be impartial, one must consciously set aside personal points of view, preferences, experiences and participate in a decision-making process that is presently under review and that results in the best outcome for the group. This requires constant self-examination and awareness that one is bringing a viewpoint into the decision. From my own experiences, I have had to ask myself if I can see the concern from the viewpoint of the other side. This requires active listening on my part and the ability to relate.


In the 1980's in Long Beach, I participated in the League of Women Voter's study on police matters in the City of Long Beach as a volunteer. It was a year-long study with well-defined processes which were aimed at reaching a reasonable conclusion. I learned how to collect information, listen and make conclusions based upon interviews and information that would further the goals of the study. I had to set aside my biases and prejudices and work as an impartial participant.

As a quality auditor in the biotech industry, I learned to collect data that was factual and that illustrated compliance (or non-compliance). I was aware of my personal bias that the auditees were good people and I may jeopardize their positions with unfavorable comments. I had to set aside my opinion and review the facts. I could not minimize the effects nor interpret the data in favor of the workers. The data must be reported without bias of the reporter and I follow this auditing principle.

My experience as a juror in Vista, CA, was valuable for learning how to listen, and contribute a viewpoint to be able to arrive at a conclusion with a group of individuals not necessarily holding the same opinions. The conduct of the jurors was moderated by the foreman and the rule was reinforced to listen without interruption.

I learned Re-evaluation Counseling techniques in order to participate in the co-counseling program. The instructors taught techniques and modeled active listening skills. The skill I learned by active listening is to hear what the speaker is saying without judgement and to be aware when I was bringing my own issues into the session. It is a skill I practiced frequently.

3. What experience do you possess that demonstrates an appreciation for the diverse demographics and geography of the County of San Diego?

I have lived in Oceanside since 2007. Prior to that time I was working and living in Solana Beach in 1999. I have lived in Los Angeles, Orange and San Diego Counties and have witnessed the differences in each of these areas. The differences are significant in terms of size, geography and population diversity. I have experienced and appreciated the geography of San Diego County. I am very familiar with the desert and mountain communities and the different concerns the residents have who live in the areas. I appreciate the agriculture areas and how it contrasts with the the development of the urban areas. I appreciate the beach communities and the issues related to ocean access including development and tourism.

San Diego County with the largest US border in terms of population with a neighboring country has impacted the local economy and interactions with the federal regulators. I believe it is critical to understand cross-border concerns and what that means for San Diego County.

I have worked in the biotech industry collecting information for research. I designed studies for collecting DNA samples and information from subjects of diverse backgrounds and ethnicities. I had to learn the senstivities and the concerns people had with regard to providing personal information.

I have worked in the medical industry and was responsible for hiring a diverse staff to care for a diverse patient population.

I am fluent in Spanish and have become familiar with the various cultures and language distinctions of person descendent from Spain. I include the Filipino populations under this broad definition. I also understand that having a similar heritage, does not necessarily conclude that the cultures are the same. Where you live in this county and where you visit your relatives, where you receive health care are all distinct to the culture.

My personal experience living in San Diego County is an appreciation of the wide range of diverse populations and identity. There are probably other communities in the US that have the language diversity, (Spanish, Tagalo, Vietnamese and others); other communities with a focus on children educational activities and a variety of services for older adults; other communities that celebrate gender diversity and racial diversity; other communities that have a large military presence and a well respected tech industry, but fewer communities can have all this and a place where tourists choose to visit. All this and more defines my experience with diversity in San Diego County, the place that I chose to live.
