In the IRC's "Draft Final Map" prior to the December 9th meeting, the Spring Valley Community Plan Area (SVCPA) was
fortunate to be restored to its intact boundaries containing the unincorporated Spring Valley and La Presa census tracts
and within the mostly unincorporated Supervisorial District 2. This was the ideal circumstance for conducting effective
planning and development support for this area. I write "was" because the map was torn apart during the December
9th meeting as the IRC seemed to abandon their previous efforts and progress at redistricting.
Spring Valley and La Presa have long been treated as stepchildren by local governments because they are
unincorporated and abut multiple cities to the north and west. Often, it seems, the only organized government
presence is the Spring Valley Community Planning Group, which may now be split between two supervisorial districts
and lumped with incorporated cities in one or more of these districts.
My observation is not driven by race, ethnic groups, regional differences, or voting blocs, which are the driving forces in
splitting this community apart and then these forces will recede from the community once the damage is done. Rather I
am only concerned about the day-to-day governance of a community that seems to only get brief attention from outside
during the end of a two year election cycle or a ten year redistricting event.
I ask that the IRC leave the unincorporated communities of Spring Valley and La Presa together in a single mostly
unincorporated San Diego County Supervisorial district.

Thank you for keeping the Black community together in the newest iterations of the Final Draft Map and I urge you to please keep the Black community in Central and Southeast San Diego in the final map. I am speaking in concern of El Cajon, and why El Cajon MUST stay in District 4. El Cajon has been included in District 4 due to months of COI testimony, where you heard directly from low-wage earners, renters, and our newcomer communities advocating to be together with other BIPOC, refugee and immigrant communities. There are not just Arab communities in El Cajon, but there are Somalis, Ethiopians, Congolese, and Afghan refugees & immigrants as well who have mutual support networks that span to City Heights. El Cajon is much different from other East County cities, as El Cajon has the highest poverty rates and the largest percent of growth in poverty among East County Cities.

If you remove El Cajon from District 4, you are keeping the status-quo that we have seen in San Diego County for decades. We have seen the effects this has on our communities - they struggle to pay rent, face increased rates of homelessness and poverty, and lack the resources they need for successful resettlement.

San Diego County welcomes more refugees than any other California county, with significant numbers of them resettling in El Cajon, and it is very likely that our region will experience the second largest resettlement of Afghan refugees in the State.

Please do not move forward with propositions to remove El Cajon from District 4. From El Cajon to City Heights, our communities must reunite. In a time of anti-Asian violence, Asian communities should not be put into white rural areas that do not align with our values. Please do not put Mira Mesa, Rancho Penasquitos and Convoy with communities in east county.
