Dear Redistricting Commissioners:

On behalf of the Center on Policy Initiatives and leaders in San Diego's Latino community, we urge you to uphold the Voting Rights Act (VRA) and adopt new supervisorial district lines that include a district where a majority of the citizen voting age population is Latino in accordance with Section 2 of the VRA.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Latinos constitute 26% of the Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP) and 23% of the county's registered voters. However, in the *last half century*, only one Latino/a candidate has been elected to serve on the five-member San Diego County Board of Supervisors.

A leading cause of that disenfranchisement is blatant gerrymandering of district lines that has diluted the voting power of South County's cohesive Latino community. Among the starkest examples is the cracking of South County Latino votes via the inclusion of overwhelmingly non-Latino communities of Point Loma and Coronado in District 1.

Now is the time to right this wrong and draw lines that give San Diego's Latino voters the fair and equal voice they deserve in the County's political process.

And this is exactly why you - independent citizen commissioners and not politicians - were chosen to draw fairer, more equitable maps for San Diego County.

Our internal analysis has shown that the drawing of a Latino CVAP majority district is not only possible, but can be accommodated by various compact and contiguous district alignments.

As a result, we believe a redistricting plan that does not include a Latino CVAP majority district would be a clear violation of Section 2 of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965.

To prevent current and future impairment of Latino Voting Rights, and to undo politically motivated gerrymanders through this first-ever Independent Redistricting process, please begin your line drawing by creating a district with greater than 50% Latino CVAP in South County.

Thank you in advance for your consideration and for upholding the Voting Rights Act.
