






What is Redistricting?

- The process of redrawing district boundaries for each of our supervisorial districts so that each has roughly equivalent populations.
- We redraw new boundaries every 10 years based on census data.

Redistricting = Rebalancing the districts so they are equal in population and will allow fair representation.












Why Are New District Boundaries Drawn?


- To account for shifts in populations
 - > Population growth from births and people moving into our county
 - Communities shrink due to deaths and migration
 - > Change as people move from one neighborhood to another
- These shifts can affect the make-up of that community and the communities' priorities, interests and goals.






- Nearly 300 applicants
- Narrowed to 60 most qualified
- First 8 Commissioners selected in random drawing.
- Next 6 Commissioners selected by first 8 based on:
 - ➤ Qualifications
 - ➤ Party affiliation (proportionate to the political party breakdown of the County)
 - Geographic and other diversity criteria


Criteria to Draw New Boundaries


- California Elections Code Section 21550-21553:
 - Have nearly equal population (~650,000 residents per district)
 - Comply with Voting Rights Act (minorities have fair opportunity to elect representative of their choice)
 - Be drawn contiguously (all parts of district are connected)
 - Minimize division of cities, counties, neighborhoods, and communities of interest
 - Be geographically compact


May NOT:

- Consider place of residence of any incumbent or political candidate
- Favor or discriminate against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party










SPECIFIC TO SAN DIEGO COUNTY

San Diego County Charter, Article IV, Section 400.1:

- At least three districts shall include unincorporated territory
- Two districts must have geographic area predominantly outside of incorporated cities
- Two must be primarily unincorporated areas




SPECIFIC TO SAN DIEGO COUNTY


2020

- Beginning 2020, Independent Redistricting Commission formed:
 - · Shifts power away from politicians and into the hands of the public
 - Requires strict nonpartisan rules for drawing maps
 - Prevents gerrymandering,
 - Produces fairer maps where citizens have a fair chance to elect the representatives of their choice



















If a majority minority can be drawn, the Voting Rights Act requires it.



What are Communities of Interest (COI)?

- A population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.
- COI do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.






