
Putting the Plan Into Action





Implementing Agreement

Required by the California NCCP Act, it is a legal agreement that identifies the roles and responsibilities to implement the North County Plan







County is responsible for ensuring public projects are consistent with the North County Plan

MSCP Findings will be documented as part of the project package or CEQA documents











Planning & Development Services

- Oversee the MSCP Implementation Oversight Committee & Land Managers Committee
- Oversee management of private mitigation land
- Assist in preparing the Annual Report
- · Lead in Plan amendments, if needed

Parks and Recreation

- Assemble and manage County Preserves
- Plan and manage recreational opportunities
- Provide public education on the MSCP
- Lead in preparing the Annual Report
- Manage and allocate MSCP funding











Public Works

- Ensure County projects are consistent with the Plan
- Maintain County infrastructure used as wildlife crossings
- Monitor stormwater structural best management practices (BMPs)

General Services

- Ensure County projects are consistent with the Plan

Extraordinary circumstances that cannot be anticipated resulting in substantial and adverse changes

Response

County is *not* responsible



Regulatory Assurances

"No Surprises" regulations exist under both the ESA and NCCP Act to provide assurances for permittees

- No additional resources or restrictions of land or water will be required should unforeseen circumstances requiring additional mitigation arise
- County remains responsible for changed circumstances
- Applies to all 40 Covered Species



Financial Assurances

ESA and NCCP Act require that adequate funding to implement the Plan will be provided

Cost Analysis

Identify County costs for:

- Land acquisition
- Preserve management and monitoring
- Restoration activities
- Adaptive management
- Program administration

County General Fund

- Primary source of funding for **County-owned preserves**
- Supports land acquisition, management, and biological monitoring of County Managed lands
- Demonstrates County's ongoing investment in implementing the **North County Plan**

Fee Program

- Secondary option in-lieu of land acquisition, when infeasible
- Species or habitat-specific fees for mitigation or habitat restoration
 - E.g., Ramona Vernal Pools mitigation fee


