Sheriff's Office volunteers are managed under three divisions: Volunteer Services (VS), Search and Rescue (SAR), and Law Enforcement Reserves (RES). Volunteer Services is comprised six subcategories including: Volunteer Sheriff's Patrol (formally Senior Volunteer Patrol), Auxiliary Communications Service (ACS), Volunteer Mounted Patrol (VMP), Chaplains, Explorers, and Citizen Volunteers. VSP's participate in the support of multiple community events and primarily perform extra neighborhood patrols, foot patrols through parks and shopping centers, monitor illegal parking, assist Deputies with road closures, traffic control and scene management, transport mobile command busses to critical incident scenes, perform evidence runs and court document delivery, facilitate fleet maintenance, conduct home vacation checks, and make thousands of calls and welfare checks to our homebound and elderly citizens enrolled in our You Are Not Alone (YANA) program.

Auxiliary Communications Service volunteers are licensed Amateur Radio Operators who activate in support of the San Diego County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) alongside San Diego Office of Emergency Services and provide reliable additional communication services during disasters.



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Volunteer Mounted Patrol Unit serve as good will ambassadors at various special events throughout the county while also providing neighborhood trail and back country patrols.

Chaplains provide an additional resource of support for all Sheriff's employees and their families. They are available for counseling, spiritual mentoring, and stress management. Chaplains respond to all critical incidents and ride with deputies in the field on a routine basis.

The Explorer program is a law enforcement apprenticeship program where youth (16-21) work directly with patrol deputies in the field and assist them with non-emergency radio calls. Explorers are valuable during parades, community fairs, and other events requiring traffic control.

Search and Rescue (SAR) personnel conduct search and rescue missions involving lost/stranded persons within the unincorporated areas of the county, contract cities, and are a county-wide resource available to any jurisdiction within the county. All SAR members are registered with the SD County Office of Disaster Preparedness and activate for natural disasters such as wildfires, flooding, earthquakes, and mud slides. SAR Volunteers are trained in first aid, search and tracking skills, repel rescue support, survival, and incident management.

Law Enforcement Reserve deputies are a group of Volunteer Deputy Sheriffs with the same training and enforcement authority of a paid Deputy Sheriff and are used to supplement patrol deputies. Specialized reserve teams with specific equipment and training expertise include the Dive Unit and Off-Road Enforcement Team.

Citizen volunteers are assigned across the stations and within a variety of special units across the department and assist with variety of administrative duties, emergency support operations, investigative unit support, and training programs.

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7. SPECIAL VOLUNTEER PROGRAM ACTIVITIES/ACHIEVEMENTS:

Please describe any special activities and/or achievements your program was involved in during the period of this report:

The Volunteer Sheriff's Patrol, Explorers, Volunteer Mounted Patrol Unit, Reserves, and Search and Rescue members participated in numerous parades, Sheriff's events, community events, and charitable events throughout the year. Our volunteers continue to represent the department at the Special Olympics (LE torch run/games), Shop with a Cop, National Night Out, and our Holiday Watch programs. Volunteers continue to support large scale events across the county such as the Avocado Festival in Fallbrook, Sandcastles in Imperial Beach, various rodeos, Fourth of July celebrations, etc. The Explorers participated in a regional competition and won first place in three of the scenario events and first place overall against 8 other agency Explorer teams. Our Chaplain unit has formed a direct partnership with the Sheriff's Wellness unit and expanded into the county jails to offer support for detentions deputies and staff, they also assist homicide detectives as a family liaison officer (FLO) regarding jail deaths.

The Reserve program now supports 11 qualified Level 1 Reserve Deputies (who can work independently), 14 qualified Level 2 Reserve Deputies and 21 qualified Level 3 Reserve Deputies who may partner with a Deputy or Level 1 Reserve Deputy.

Several Search and Rescue members responded and assisted with search and recovery operations throughout the areas affected by the Los Angeles Fires. Three SAR members assisted the Riverside Sheriff's Office during a mutual aid request. Two people were injured and had to be rescued off a mountain face during extreme snow conditions. This search was very dangerous however, the injured people were rescued and safely removed off the mountain.

Our program ambitions for FY2025-2026 are to continue our recruiting efforts to grow our volunteer teams across all units within the volunteer programs. We strive to enhance recruitment opportunities by increasing collaboration with Media Relations on special events and improve community engagement opportunities. This will allow us to attract motivated volunteers who have a strong desire to serve their communities. We look forward to showcasing our extensive volunteer training opportunities and talent. We are expanding our services in our YANA program to include emergency preparedness by guiding the enrolled members through the development of their personal emergency action plan and ensuring they are registered to receive emergency notifications on their cell phones and land lines. We will continue to work and collaborate with our San Diego County law enforcement agencies. We will work with community leaders to participate in local community events and create outreach programs to establish and maintain lasting community partnerships throughout San Diego County.
